We are extremely proud of the girls and I am sure you agree, they are great. All of the girls have returned to school with such a positive attitude to learning. All of our staff have been saying how great it is to be back face to face with the girls.

We welcome our new Year 7 parents and carers to our newsletter. You will see that Year 7 feature across the pages. Students and staff across the school have been participating in Black History Month. Students have been learning about black history in many different ways across the curriculum and will be continuing to do throughout the year.

Dalia in 8PT has challenged herself to write a book - she has shared snippets of this with her form tutor. Ms Teixeira






All students at Bentley Wood High School take GCSE and non-religious issues in contemporary British society. The trip to the church enabled students, many of whom understanding of the Christian religion.





# Black History Month and student year group assemblies



# Virtual maths competition for real world challenges - UKMT 2020

On 6 October Year 11 and sixth form students completed in the International Mathematical Olympiad (IMO) which is an international competition for High School students leading awarding mathematic champions for competing in mathematics challenges from algebra, calculus and branches of mathematics sometimes not even covered in schools. This prestigious event works on the principle that anyone with a basic understanding of mathematics should understand the problems but the solutions require ingenuity in applying their knowledge to solve the questions! The Bentley Wood team consisted of Year 11 pupils Sarah, Claudia, Marie and Heena and Sixth Formers Amira, Hiba, Nitya, Hafsah, Baano, Arani and Marafie. The event was held virtually this year and our students described the experience as a challenge which opened your eyes to the application of their maths learning to the real world.

### How does "fake news" link to vaccinations?

- Misinformation was first spread in the UK on vaccines when the now discredited doctor, Andrew Wakefield, published a case of 12 children with Autism in 1998 claiming a link between the MMR vaccination and autism. [4]
- This false information was spread nation wide among parents who did not want to vaccinate their children out of fear of developing
- There have been multiple cases of Measles in Western countries that previously had eradicated Measles, with 2018 having 41, 000 cases in children and adults, higher than any year this decade [5]

#### How does this affect the development of vaccines?

- It is a large issue within itself that there is more dependency on online resources rather than sources from the scientific community itself and a lack of trust in medical professionals and members of the scientific community
- Vaccine hesitancy makes it harder to introduce herd immunity to the public and protect vulnerable members of society.
- Additionally vaccine hesitancy causes deaths that would have been otherwise preventable



### What is herd immunity and why is it important?

- In order for a vaccine to work significantly and protect a large population, there must be herd immunity
- Where most of the population is vaccinated against a disease and therefore indirectly protecting vulnerable members of the population e.g. elderly and new-born



#### How does social media play a key role in promoting vaccine hesitancy?

- Social media gives greater visibility to groups that spread scientifically unsound information
- It allows like minded individuals to collect, reproduce and redistribute misinformation in the form of eye – catching posts and backed by fraudulent references
- Majority of these groups arrange these activities on (but not limited to) Facebook, with many Facebook groups and thousands of members to spread misinformation.

### Bots and Vaccines as a political tool:

- Bots are software that runs an automated action on the internet. They make up to 52% of internet traffic.
- Researchers that evaluated over 1.7 million posts related to vaccines have found that Twitter bots and trolls tweet about vaccines more frequently than average Twitter users do, particularly Russian bots that posted pro vaccine and anti – vaccine posts in order to stir up controversial discussion
- There have also been cases of vaccines being used in politics in rural areas of Pakistan, where the wild polio virus is still rife, however many villages refuse the mandatory vaccine claiming they will only take the polio vaccine in exchange for structural development and improvement on their water systems or electricity [7] [8]

#### What can be done to stop spread of "fake news"?

- It is important to recognise that the anti vaccination campaign is driven by fear and therefore in order to safely avert a health crisis and regain trust from the public in the scientific community, the general public must be well informed of vaccines
- Stricter government guidelines, like that of Italy, that has introduced a policy that all children must be vaccinated in order to enter school. Additionally the importance of vaccines can be taught in school
- The reach of social media can be utilised by the scientific community in order to reach wider audiences and educate the public on vaccine additionally social media sites themselves can aide this effort by
- banning, and not displaying content from anti vaccine source.

# Sixth Form Placements


## Nuffield Research Placement

The Nuffield Research Placement is a national programme for Year 12 students that offers research experience in science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM) by working with a professional researcher in the field you want to go into. The program offers a bursary for students who meet the criteria and finish the whole placement fully.

I was allocated a place with the Environment Agency over 6 weeks in the summer holiday. gained so many different research skills dealing rata representation. correct referencing and identifying good resources. My research was based on the causes of the loss of Saltmarsh area and the program pairs you with a specialist in that field, so in my case I got a supervisor from the Environment Agency that talked me through writing up my results and how to use excel for data analysis which was really fun and gave me insight into the work of the Environment Agency. If you don't find Saltmarshes appealing, don't worry - the program works across the UK with different universities in a range of different subjects!

My number one tip is to get the application out of the way early on, it is a really good to put on your personal statement, free (and you might get a bursary) and it is such a valuable experience!

# Careers advice and Digital School information

## Careers advice for students at Bentley Wood

My name is Eugenia Mmireku and I am the new Careers adviser here at Bentley Wood School from the Education Development Trust. I have been appointed to work at the school, Monday to Thursday 8.30-4.00pm in the careers office next to V3 and V4. I offer an impartial, personalised and confidential service to all students at Bentley Wood.

Currently I am conducting 1-1 careers interviews with Year 11s for a 40 minute session. I still get the time to meet students from other years when required. I do however encourage Year 11s to email me or other Year groups who want to book an appointment who I will happily see.

I tend to have a drop in session between 2pm and 3pm each day for follow up career sessions sometimes booked for about half an hour and urgent queries. Students come to me for a range of issues from Sixth Form admissions, apprenticeships where I have access to updated apprenticeship providers and general information queries on Apprenticeships as well as giving advice on university applications, personal statements and subject specific advice.

I offer an inclusive service with a mentoring approach and ensuring there are clear and defined paths to careers where the students can make effective decisions. At the end of the session they will get an Action plan which highlights their career goals and a copy sent to the class teacher and head of year.

Due to Covid 19 restrictions I am not organising school work experience but asking students to find their own placements for the time being until the COVID pandemic is over however I do organise virtual employment and education encounter sessions across the year groups for students. I have a great supply of 2020/2021 prospectuses from a range of universities and colleges which I am happy to give out. There is also a range of books and careers literature which I can loan to students which make interesting reading.

There is also a section in the library for careers where there are a range of prospectuses and careers information available to all students which the careers leaders continually update and maintain. The careers leaders will also take part in assemblies and talks to present to others current achievements in careers and memorable events. Sometimes their role allows them to have exposure and publicity to the press and various media if desired promoting the excellent work and achievements of Bentley Wood School.

NEWS - The Autumn Annual Bentley Wood Careers Fair although will not be taking place as usual here at the school as a public event will be going ahead as a virtual Careers event. This October and running into December there will be Virtual talks from Employers, Russel Group Universities ,Colleges and Apprenticeship providers. This will be happening as evening events and in the October half term and school holidays.

Exciting News!!! Congratulations to five Year 9 students, five Year 10 and six Year 11s who qualified as Careers Leaders at Bentley Wood. The year 10s and 11 students were existing students but the year 9s and one of the year 10s faced tough competition after telling me why they wanted to be a Careers Leader.

For those of you who want to know a bit more about the role of the Careers Leaders. They are representatives and ambassadors of their year group facilitating the work of the careers service. They support me in Careers fairs by creating posters and leaflets to advertise the events and act as excellent role models to their peers helping where they can with students career aspirations.

We meet regularly to discuss changes and issues in the careers industry particularly during this pandemic of COVID. At the moment we will be meeting on teams or in small year groups. I am happy to announce the following students will be supporting me as Careers Leaders.



Bentley Wood High School is proud of the programme of digital online learning delivered to students this year and has developed the MS platform to offer blended learning providing exceptional levels of student engagement, interaction, and communication with students as required.

The Microsoft digital school platform facilitates and supports learning through an infrastructure which enables a seamless transition between physical and digital teaching all underpinned by our values of CARE - Communication - Achievement - Respect - Empathy.

The digital platform which were used so successfully during lockdown are now utilised for online support, communication and the delivery of homework assignments, forming a rich content and a variety of touch points across different subjects for students to access and engage with content and resources as well as an easy and rapid transition process to support learning at home and various tiered provision as and when necessary.

Face to face teaching is the natural choice of learning and MS Teams is a flexible, interactive choice can be utilised as a parallel delivery resource which has received outstanding and widespread support of our parents and carers.

# Microsoft TEAMS learning hub

Microsoft Teams in parallel other Office 365 applications provided an platform for teaching and learning and communication to continue in an online environment this year and the school is continuing to train our current year 7s on Teams as part of their induction process. Ongoing training on the use of specific elements as well as the sharing of best practice of Teams is part of the core training.

# Information and advice for students and parents

## Free School Meals eligibility

Children are entitled to receive free school meals if they or their parents or guardians receive any of the benefits below.

- Universal Credit, provided they have an annual net earned income not exceeding £7,400 (£616.67 per month)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The quarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190, as assessed by HMRC
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

I don't currently claim free school meals - what does this mean for me?

If you think you might be eligible for free school meals, please see instructions here on how to check and apply.

I am currently claiming free school meals - what does this mean for me?

Most people won't be affected by the new criteria. If you're currently claiming free school meals, but do not meet the new criteria, your child will continue to receive free school meals until the end of the Universal Credit rollout period.

This will apply even if your earnings rise above the new threshold or if you stop being entitled to Universal Credit. The rollout period is currently scheduled to end on 31st March 2022.

Once Universal Credit is fully rolled out, your child will keep their free school meal until the end of their current phase of education, i.e. primary or secondary.

## Coronavirus Updates

We are very proud of the way the Bentley Wood community responded to the measures put in place to ensure students and staff could return to school safely at the start of September.

We have adapted to new routines very quickly to ensure protocols and procedures, which are constantly refined, are followed in order to reduce the risk.

Information for parents can be found on our website. This includes the <u>DfE guidance for parents</u>, <u>Public Health England's guidance</u> on what to do if you or someone you share your home with has coronavirus symptoms, and the schools' <u>site protocol for students</u>.

A reminder of some of the safety measures in place at school:

- Windows and doors open to aid ventilation we recommend students wear thermal layers under their school uniform and thick tights as the weather becomes colder.
- Hands all wash or sanitise hands regularly throughout the day, including upon arrival, before and after eating, after using a tissue to catch a sneeze or cough
- Face Face coverings worn by students and staff in all communal areas as well as in classrooms. Parents are asked to ensure their daughter has their mask with them each day
- Space Timings of the day are staggered to minimise
  possibilities of year group bubbles mixing, with year
  group zones in place for break and lunchtimes and
  a 'movement around the school' system for all. All
  reminded to maintain a safe distance (2 metres) from
  adults and students from other year groups
- **Each student** comes to school with their own equipment so that they do not share with others
- Cleaners are on site throughout the day ensuring high touch surfaces, toilets and communal areas are washed down regularly
- **Students** use antibacterial surface wipes and hand sanitisers which are found in every classroom to ensure their work area is clean at the start of every lesson
- Catch it Bin it Kill it posters are in every room reminding all to prevent germs spreading easily

All parents are reminded to contact the school, ensure their daughter stays at home and arrange a COVID-19 test if they or anyone in their household has symptoms of coronavirus:

- a high temperature
- a new cough where you keep on coughing. This means coughing a lot for more than an hour or three or more episodes of coughing in a day Losing or there being a change to your sense of smell or taste

Any student who is required to self-isolate is able to continue with their learning through the school's digital learning provision.

What do I need to do now? Please ensure we have your correct mobile number and email address on our school database to ensure you can use the new app as soon as it is available. Forms are available from the school office to check and update your details or simply email them to the school. You'll need to make sure you keep these details up to date in future to maintain access to the service.

What happens next? Download The Xpressions app onto your phone. The app will go through a step by step registration with you. You will be asked to enter your email address and your mobile number. You must ensure the details you enter at registration are the same as the information we hold on the school database. When you have entered details correctly you will receive a text message to your mobile phone containing a 6 digit code. Enter the code and login.
