I know you will join me in saying a huge thank you to the teaching and support staff who have worked so hard this year. Their continued care for the girls is highly appreciated.


I think we are all looking forward to 2021. We are being very positive in our thoughts regarding the success of vaccinations against the virus. We have been thinking of you all.







Harrow Youth Parliament election news 2020

Congratulations to our new Harrow Youth Parliament representatives!

Our representatives have submitted excellent video campaigns and were voted into their new positions by their fellow peers on Tuesday 17th November. They will now step up to represent local young people in the Harrow Youth Parliament.

This is particularly important as young people do not have the opportunity to vote in general elections until the age of 18. Our representatives will ensure that the views of young people are therefore not dismissed!

The Harrow Youth Parliament is the highest level of authority for young people in Harrow. Members will have the opportunity to consult with councillors and MPs and be further elected to the UK-wide Youth Parliament.

The members will meet online every Wednesday afternoon to discuss Council and Government policies and how they affect young people in Harrow. We would like to wish our new Harrow Youth Parliament Representatives good luck in this exciting initiative!

Harrow Youth Parliament has four sub-groups reflecting the Council's priorities. The subgroups work with council officers, agencies, service providers and councillors in planning, delivering and evaluating services provided for young people. This is done through consultations, meetings, workshop, outreach work, projects, conferences and debates.

Last year our Youth Parliament representatives got involved in causes such as mental well-being in young people, worked on social and charitable projects, and provided a voice for young people in Harrow to discuss and get involved in matters concerning them as well as being able to influence decisions on issues affecting them.

Year 7 Castles Competition











Every Year 7 group has been researching a project in history about the impact that William the Conqueror and the Normans had on England. They looked at negative impacts, such as the violence Harrying of the North, and positive impacts, such as his building of stone keeps and motte and bailey castles across the English landscape.

Year 7 were given the task to create their own castles, either a stone keep or motte and bailey, from recycled material that they could find around their house! We had a broad range of sustainable material used, such as cardboard boxes from Amazon deliveries, toilet roll, ice cream sticks and even toy figurines from younger siblings.

Each student gave a presentation about the creation of their castle and the defensive features. In some lessons they even talked about how they would attack a castle like the one presented in front of them! The winning castles in each form group are going in the library and a whole school voting competition will happen on Teams shortly!

Students engage in engineering and coding challenges



Lego League and STEM Club

This term students have been busy building robots to take part in the First Lego League - an international STEM competition held every year to promote students engineering, coding and creative skills.

The Year 10 students will need to build and program a robot which can autonomously move around a set course while completing a number of objectives such as lifting Lego blocks and placing them in specific areas.

Students will continue to refine their robots and code over the coming months, in preparation for the finals which are to be held in March 2021.

Students will also need to come up with a pitch for a creative way to get people in the community more active such as designing new sports equipment to be installed in a local park. They will need to produce detailed designs for their ideas as well as 3D models, to convince the judging panel that their idea will be a success.

Year 8 take part in the Faraday Challenge

"I really enjoyed the Faraday Challenge. I thought it would be a workshop where we look at experiments on things that Michael Faraday did in his lifetime, however I didn't expect us to be doing experiments. We watched videos on engineering, medicine and remote surgery.

Our challenge was to create a device that can be used to move two different sized balls representing the (heart and kidneys) into two containers (they were placed on the correct places for those organs on the patient, a piece of cardboard with a person drawn on). We had a budget that we had to spend to create our device and buy equipment.

Firstly we assigned roles: manager, chief engineers, accounting manager and pitch manager - each person was important in creating the device. The first thing we had to do was to design a prototype. We came up with several designs and then debated on which one to go with, each one had its flaws so we all decided to develop a new idea using our previous designs and improving it to make it cheaper and stronger. We finally decided on having two sticks one with a cup on the side and another with a block of wood that was thin and the right size to hold the ball into the cup and move it.

Then the most exciting part came.... making the device. Our chief engineers got to work and while they worked the pitch manager got started designing and planning their pitches and the posters they were going to use to advertise the device.

As the manager, I helped by adding things that the pitch managers could talk about. We decided on the name DR HK (for heart and kidney). Then for practice for our pitch managers we sat and watched them practise their pitches. Then we used random objects to practise and test out our device, everyone got a chance to try. We did this to see who the best person at moving the objects was so they could do it for the final test.

The challenge was against other groups from Year 8, there was 4 groups. We were given points judged on teamwork, the pitch, getting it into the cup and the speed of doing it. Then came the time for the pitch managers to advertise DR HK. After all of the groups finished came the part that determined everything testing if our devices worked. We had to look at a screen instead of looking directly at the patient and we had to stand a metre away.

My group got it into the containers with the fastest speed only followed by group 1 by one second! After all the groups went then we discussed things that went well and things that could have been improved in our group until Dr Campbell was ready to tell us the results. We came first! it was close competition between the groups. They all did well as the results were so close. I recommend getting involved in this challenge, it was competitive and exciting. I am extremely grateful for the teachers who organised this experience. The Faraday Challenge brings together young people to consider solutions to real world problems and encourages the development of problem solving, teamworking and communication.

Year 9 students have been learning how to create their own apps last term using software called 'AppShed'. They created apps for tourists traveling to London to use to help them find their way around. Year 9 have also started to learn coding using Python this term which they will continue throughout years 9 and 10 to develop their ability to write computer programs.

"I am so glad I went to this live stream all about programming and computing because it taught me what programmers do and about different careers you can join in Computing and Technology.

It was a very interesting event because there were different people talking about what they do in Computing and Technology. One of the lecturers had taken a career path for technology and she was allowed to program street lights and traffic lights!

I learnt so much new information and at the end we got to order badges! I was told computer programmers design, develop, and test software and ensure software adheres to best practices in performance, reliability and security.

Computer programmers can work developing mobile applications, coding video games, programming websites, and much more.

I got to meet programmers virtually who worked in different roles in computing, such as those people who use maths to ensure TfL's software releases are on time, defect free, reliable and fit for purpose.

I got to know what A level and degree choices I could make within Computing such as Maths Computer Science, and Philosophy. At the end of the live event, we got to ask many questions to the programmers and we learnt a lot.

This live event has taught me that anyone can become a programmer whether you are curious in solving puzzles, like maths or you are creative! It has also taught me that programmers are well paid and can make a difference such as building programmes and apps that make the world a better place. This live event has given me a real insight into computing which is why I advise anyone who is interested in computing to enter these live events. Trust me it will benefit you so much!"


Computing students receive Gold Awards for the BEBRAS Challenge 2020



This year students in Year 8, 9 and 10 have taken part in the UK BEBRAS Computational Thinking challenge 2020. These challenges are part of a national competition in which students have to solve a series of problems which vary in difficulty within a set time. These problems aim to develop students 'computational thinking' skills such as pattern recognition, algorithmic thinking, logical thinking and abstraction. We are pleased to announce that three Bentley Wood students Sara 10LSB, Sana 9MCO and Maryam 9SSE were awarded 'gold awards' for their achievements. Well done to all students who took part.

"The BEBRAS challenge sets a series of questions. It challenges you to think differently to overcome the problems. It is a really fun way of going on the journey to start understanding computational thinking. There are




different levels of difficulty for different age groups from Juniors to Elites. This year I entered the 'Intermediates' which meant the problems we had to solve were tricky, but not impossible. They really stretched my logical thinking skills!

It has definitely taught me to consider all options when trying to solve problems. It gets you to systematically solve problems using your own logic rather than following a method. I'm glad we did it because it has sharpened my mind and developed important skills for computing.

I also did it last year and it is great to see the progress after 1 year. It is a good way to test your problem solving skills and also just have some fun! It was an amazing experience and I would recommend it."

This year. we've partnered with the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) a part of GCHQ – to launch a new campaign with one aim: getting more girls to start their careers in cyber security.

The world of technology is ever-changing and so are the online threats facing us. But the NCSC is committed to making the UK the safest place to live and work online

That's why they created the **CyberFirst Girls Competition**, designed to help girls between the ages of 12-13 understand what a career in cyber security looks like, why it matters and where it could take them. 


Year 11 perform!




Parallel Maths project


EtonX programme for Sixthformers at Bentley Wood High School

EtonX courses are designed to help students develop the skills they need to succeed in the future, both at university and in the workplace.

Year 13 students attend Research Skills course which develops their ability to conduct independent research that goes far beyond their textbooks or basic internet searches. Students learn how to gather information from a wide range of credible resources and how to structure the research process. Students learn about tools and techniques to save their time and how to reference their sources correctly. By the end of the course they will feel confident about their findings and know how to present them in a clear and convincing way. Year 12 students attend Writing Skills course which teaches them the techniques students need to help them produce best work no matter what the essay question.

By the end of this course our Year 12 students will be able to:

- Analyse the essay question and define their tasks
- Techniques for efficient planning
- Create coherent structure
- Develop an argument and write purposeful introductions and conclusions
- Use appropriate language
- Avoid plagiarism and use reference material appropriately
- Check their essays for accuracy and consistency



Social Mobility Foundation

The Social Mobility Foundation is a charity that helps high achieving young people from low-income backgrounds enter the top universities and professions. Each year a number of 6th formers from Bentley Wood gain places on this programme.

Social Mobility Foundation Programmes include a mentor from the young person's chosen profession, university application support (including trips to universities & skills workshops) as well as work placements across Sixth Form and university years.




The Lumina Mock Interview Evening

There are, however, reasons to believe that guantum theory may ultimately have to be modified into a new theory: for instance, it will have to be merged with general relativity, to incorporate gravity; and some claim that it may be impossible to have quantum effects beyond a certain macroscopic scale. So what lies ahead of quantum theory, and of the universal quantum computer?

This 'Physics of Can and Can't' may be the first step towards the ultimate generalisation of the universal quantum computer, which von Neumann called the 'universal constructor'. 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




Mindfulness course for Sixth Formers



Note the following:

Students will be required to attend school only to sit exams during the following dates:

• Mon 4th Jan to Wed 6th Jan 2021

We consider these to be of equal importance to external examinations. It is therefore crucial that your daughter ensures she prepares for the exams by attending revision sessions, completing homework thoroughly.

JCQ Regulations apply to all external exams and are updated annually.

The latest information can be found on the School Website under Information/Exams Information

New JCQ Regulation: it is now a compulsory requirement for all candidates to take off any wrist watches and place it on their desks during all exams. Candidates are reminded they are not allowed to take into an exam room potential technological/web enabled sources of information such as an **iPod**, a **mobile phone**, a **MP3/4 player**, a **smartwatch** or a **wrist watch** which has a data storage device.

- Keep your individual exam timetable handy it has all the dates, times and seat numbers for all your exams
- Arrive on time and with the correct stationery (including calculators, where allowed) in a clear plastic pencil case
- All mobile phones, notes, bags and outdoor clothing should be left in your lockers
- Wrist watches must be removed and placed on desk.

Free School Meals eligibility

Children are entitled to receive free school meals if they or their parents or guardians receive any of the benefits below.

- Universal Credit, provided they have an annual net earned income not exceeding £7,400 (£616.67 per month)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190, as assessed by HMRC
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

I don't currently claim free school meals – what does this mean for me?

If you think you might be eligible for free school meals, please see instructions here on how to check and apply.

I am currently claiming free school meals – what does this mean for me?

Most people won't be affected by the new criteria. If you're currently claiming free school meals, but do not meet the new criteria, your child will continue to receive free school meals until the end of the Universal Credit rollout period. This will apply even if your earnings rise above the new threshold or if you stop being entitled to Universal Credit. The rollout period is currently scheduled to end on 31st March 2022.

Once Universal Credit is fully rolled out, your child will keep their free school meal until the end of their current phase of education, i.e. primary or secondary.

Understanding and Managing Anxiety - Free 5 Week Online Course for Parents

No-one has been untouched by this crisis and many of us are struggling with anxiety during these times of constant change. If you are struggling with your sleep, your concentration, spiralling thoughts then we would like to help you.

The Schools Counselling Partnership are offering a **5-week online programmen(via zoom)** to help you understand and manage your anxiety. During this programme you will gain:

- A good understanding of excessive worry (Generalised Anxiety Disorder)
- An understanding of how worry can be maintained and the links between our thoughts, feelings, physical sensations and behaviours
- Knowledge of several techniques which can be used to help reduce your anxiety and worry
- Awareness of your early warning signs for anxiety and have a plan in place to maintain progress and manage setbacks.

Cognitive Behavioural Therapy helps us to identify the cause of our anxiety, our thinking around it and then it offers strategies to help us manage. This course does require an element of homework each week and you need to be able to commit to this to really see the benefit.

This is a confidential course, however, it isn't important to know that it isn't group therapy where you will be required to share what is going on for you it is more of a reflective practise with some exercises to help you cope. How much participate with the group is entirely up to you. If you don't want to participate you are welcome to just listen, reflect on what you are learning and practise the exercises.

Zoom links and handouts each session will be sent out 3 days before. You won't need to read any of the handouts

When we heard of Mr Bamisaiye's achievement we asked him to tell us more so that we could share the great news with the Aylward Community, this is what he had to say:



Parent to School App

View your child's information on your mobile phone! An exciting new service is now available for parents to ensure communication between the school and yourselves is easier and more effective. The app is completely free of charge to you and can be installed on your mobile phone or tablet. It currently supports both Apple iOS and Android devices (with Windows mobile to follow) and you'll be able to see information for your children.
