
Classic Club

Heads of Year and Heads of Department have celebrated the success of individuals. Every student mentioned in this newsletter or in assemblies has been very worthy of praise.





Student success in maths competitions and clubs

Maths in Art

Students have attended sessions on Mathematical art. They have helped them to reinforce many important mathematical skills such as accurate measuring and constructing, visual problem solving and strategic forward planning.

Example 1: Christmas Stars & Trees The aim was to understand how to create a geometrical curve using straight lines only and apply the technique to design and sew a Christmas Card.






Example 2: Rangoli patterns are traditionally made using rice, flour, sand or chalk, they can be found on the floor near the entrance to a house to welcome guests. During Diwali, Hindus use Rangoli patterns to encourage the goddess Lakshmi to enter their homes

Example 4: Benjamin's clock

The girls used their knowledge of mathematics to design a clock face using their creativity to connect their learning of Benjamin Banneker and his contributions to our society and to mathematics!

How did Benjamin Banneker's clock work?

Sometime in the early 1750s, Benjamin borrowed a pocket watch from a wealthy acquaintance, took the watch apart and studied its components. After returning the watch, he created a fully functioning clock entirely out of carved wooden pieces. The clock was amazingly precise, and would keep on ticking for decades.

Example 5: Patchwork Paper Patterns

This fun paper-folding lesson makes use of William Gibbs' and Liz Meenan's excellent Paper Magic resource which Liz has kindly allowed me to share.

Students are shown how to fold six different polygons. They then explore tessellating or layering polygons of various shapes and sizes to achieve a stunning 'patchwork' effect. The paper folding process provides plenty of opportunities for rich mathematical discussion. Student creativity is then given free rein when they plan and execute their designs.

The Maths Olympiad for Girls and The Senior Maths Challenge

The Senior Maths Challenge saw the Main Hall packed with over 50 students. Some students did so well that they qualified automatically for the British Maths Olympiad Round 1 in which they will compete against some of the strongest young mathematicians in the country in a 3.5hour marathon of incredibly hard problems, another national competition we expect them to do remarkable things in.

Students learn new skills at Chess and Science Club

Chess Club has been hugely popular this term

Wednesday lunchtime is filled with eager young Magnus Carlsens, all engaged in a competitive battle of strategy and skill.

For most of our students, chess club this term has been their first introduction to this venerable game. They have learned the basic chess opening principles:

- Control the centre (put one of the central pens two • squares forward)
- Develop your pieces (get your knights and bishops working)
- Safety of the king (castle at the first opportunity)

After the privilege of a masterclass visit from International Master Lorin Dacosta earlier this term, the girls have been encouraged to sign up to the Lichess online platform so that they can extend their chess to beyond a weekly chess club in school.

The Lichess platform has some fantastic learning tools and gives the girls a chance to play others of their ability. There is a child safety mode on the platform where the chat feature is blocked, so Lichess is perfectly safe for children even as young as 5 years old.

As the students get more familiar with the basic rules of chess, the next learning will be to slow the students down by getting them to write every move they make in chess notation. At the moment, and as is normal for most beginner

Science Club: Fish eye dissection

In Science Club this Friday, we discussed and explored the anatomy of a fish eye. Watching a clear and coherent video, followed by a thorough demonstration, allowed the Year 7s to explore the eye of a fish with great intricacy.

This demonstration allowed the girls to get a visual representation of the physiology behind the simple act of seeing. As expressed by the students, all of us were fascinated by the complexity of the eye but the durability is what especially caught our attention, with the outer white part of the eye (sclera for our scientists) being tough to cut into at the beginning of the dissection. After talking to a couple of the girls, it was concluded that removing the lens from the vitreous chamber without causing damage was the most challenging part.

As required, much attention was paid to health and safety and ensuring that as well as inspecting the evel the scientists understood the hazards that come with it. This could not have been done without Mr. Koyejo and Ms. Patel.

Year 12 Students experience a real court room trial

The bar mock trial competition is a popular event which is designed to give students an opportunity to gain experience in courtroom procedures. Teams of Year 12 students competed against each other by simulating a courtroom trial, taking on the roles of lawyers, witnesses, and other participants. In order to prepare for the competition, students had to carefully research and memorise the statements of witnesses and anticipate challenging questions that may be asked in the courtroom.

The London round of the competition, which was held at Snaresbrook Crown Court in East London, involved teams of students from a variety of schools across London competing against each other in a series of trials. The teams were given two hypothetical cases to prepare for, and they spent time researching and rehearsing their arguments and presentations. On the day of the competition, each team presented their case in front of the judges and a courtroom audience, with the lawyers presenting opening and closing statements, examining and cross-examining witnesses, and making legal arguments. The judges evaluated the teams' performances and decided on two winning teams to go forward to the final.

The competition was a valuable learning experience for law students, as it allowed them to develop their legal skills and gain hands-on experience in a courtroom setting. Many students found the competition to be a thrilling and rewarding experience, as it allowed them to apply what they had learned in their studies to a realistic legal scenario. At the same time, the competition could also be nerve-wracking for some participants, as the pressure of performing in front of a panel of judges and an audience could be intimidating. Year 7 Castle Competition

Every year, Year 7 history students are given the opportunity to enter the Castle building competition. We teach them about the Norman conquest and how William the Conqueror built castles across the country to establish his control.

This is investigated in the classroom by looking at the different types of Norman Castles built in the 11th Century and the advantages and disadvantages of these castles. This enquiry is based on Windsor Castle which was an original Norman Motte and Bailey Castle, developed over the centuries to become the impressive stone residence of the monarchy today.

Later this year, the whole of Year 7 will visit Windsor Castle as part of their History curriculum enrichment, bringing some of this learning to life.

The entries are always fantastic and the whole school votes on the top three castles created by our students. They are encouraged to find items around the house and reuse common items to be sustainable with their projects and to ensure equal access to the curriculum for all.

Two Year 7 students have shared their experience here:

I chose to design and create the Motte and Bailey Castle over the October half term. Because of its simplicity, it was easy to build. I used a cardboard box, tissue-paper, toothpicks, string, plastic cup, felt sheet and a sharpie. I spent around four hours to complete it.

My favourite fact about the Normans is the Bayeux Tapestry, which is significant as it provides information about the civil and military architecture such as castle mounds, armour consisting of a nasal helmet. The whole story of the Norman invasion, including the Battle of Hastings, is shown in the 70m long tapestry. It shows scenes of battle, and can be seen today at Bayeux, in France.


















The Anthropology Society visits the Wellcome Collection

Project Fairy by Jacqueline Wilson




Sixth Form Badminton Club

When and Where can you find me?

You can find me in school everyday. You can find me before school.

If you aren't sure where I am, ask any teacher, they will help you find me!

What is a Social Worker?

- My role as a social worker is to support children to ensure that they are happy, safe and have everything they need at home, in school and out in the community.
- This means my job is to focus on YOU!
- Your safety
- Your welfare Your wellbeina

Who do I work with?

- I work with children, young people and their families when they are going through difficult times.
- I work with children who witness unsafe relationships, for example arguments between parents or family members.
- I work with families where someone has a mental health issue or disability for which they might need some extra support.
- I also work with parents who have a dependency which means they may not always be able to care for their children to the best of their ability.
- Additionally, I work with children who are at risk outside of the family home. This could mean they are being forced by someone else to do something they don't want to. Perhaps this person is older or has a negative influence on them and they don't feel able to say 'no'.

Why am I in your school?

- I am part of the new and exciting Social Worker In Schools Team.
- I am here to work alongside the student support team.
- This means I am available to you if you need to talk to someone about something that is worrying or upsetting you.

Staying Safe

Some safety tips for students:

- Always tell someone where you are going and what time you will return.
- Talk to a trusted adult if anyone says or does anything that worries or frightens you. A trusted adult might be a family member or please contact the school someone will be there to support you.
- Don't put up with abusive texts, photos or video. Show them to an adult and report them.
- Don't lend your mobile phone to anyone unless it is an emergency.
- Don't let anyone online trick you into doing something or sending pictures against your wishes.
- Never give personal information to any person you don't know.

- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

Mock exams update

Full details and individual candidate timetables will be provided two weeks prior to the start of the exams. We consider these to be of equal importance to external examinations. Dropping off and collecting your daughter from school




