## Science Club: Students get messy making slime

This week on 13 January we got our hands really sticky and made some slime! Students were able to see a chemical reaction right in front of their eyes.

This week we had numerous excited Year 7s who were ready to get their hands really sticky and make some slime! Given clear and coherent instructions by Mr Koyejo, the students were able to set off and were limitless in making and mixing colours and ingredients. This experiment allowed the girls to understand the type of chemical reactions that can occur and why – in this case the polyvinyl alcohol found in PVA glue reacts with the borate ions in bicarbonate of soda when mixed with contact lens solution. These are household items so everyone can give it a try! As always, paying attention to health and safety, students and staff worked efficiently together to clean up and get home for the weekend.



## Students build power plant models showing different forms of energy

For our science project we were asked to build a power plant station replica. I had decided that I would be making a hydroelectric related power plant as it was interactive, fun and renewable. Since I was making a renewable power plant I decided to reuse materials from home. I had a wind turbine and a couple of one-time use plastic containers. First, I planned out the logistics and how the water would travel through the power plant. Then I started gluing bits and pieces on making sure that the measurements lined up and the water flowed smoothly.

After everything lined up, I tested it to make sure everything was working, and the turbine spun well. Lastly, I just had to print out information and secure it with tape to make sure nothing gets wet. In the end I had decided to go with making a dam and thankfully everything went well. For extra detail I had added a light bulb that was connected to battery and an on and off switch to show how electricity would be generated and outputted.

When I brought it to class everyone was very excited to try it out and each took turns pouring water into it. Mr Koejo came into room to look at our power plants and brought in Year 11 to see what we had done. Then Ms Patel came in and so did Ms Akbar.

They were all proud of how much we had accomplished since this was the first time the project had been set and overall it was great to see everyone's models and hard work all together.

Students created Maths valentine handmade cards to celebrate the day and their love for maths!!! Origami Hearts


### Celtic Knotwork

### **Mazes and Labvrinths**






Impossible Triangles


### Bob Blackman Q&A

### Holocaust survivor memoir talk

On Friday 19th January Bentley Wood was privileged to host Hephzibah Rudofsky, daughter of Holocaust survivor Lady Zahava Kohn for an in-depth talk about the life of her late mother and her experiences during the Holocaust.

Hephzibah delivered a powerful speech and PowerPoint outlining exactly what her mother went through, being smuggled out of the country during WWII, and her parents leaving her baby brother in the Netherlands to be hidden as it was safer for him there.

Lady Zahava had a troublesome childhood. At 8 years old she was taken into a concentration camp with her parents but was left alone during the day whilst her parents worked tirelessly for the Nazis.

We were shown an impactful PowerPoint and amazing original artefacts owned by Lady Zahava's mother. It was a surreal experience to see these items that are now over 70 years old. Lady Zahava's experience of the concentration camps had an element of luck. Unfortunately she contracted chicken pox but her parents were able to convince Nazi guards they must travel together when being moved camps so they managed to stay together.

The experience was hugely beneficial as it gave a personal insight into the Holocaust and has better helped my understanding of WWII, a topic I studied at the end of Year 8.

Bentley Wood Library is inviting students to join us as we embark on our travels around the world in 2023. From the comfort of your favourite reading spot – an armchair, your bed, or even the 340 bus in rush hour - you can travel the world and get to know places through the words of writers.

Every half term we will sojourn in a new destination to explore the richness of its culture, past and present, as we delve into its literary heritage.

Our first port of call is Japan - a rather apt choice given that *The Tale of Genji* by Murasaki Shikibu is considered to be the world's first novel. Written in the 11th century by a noblewoman and lady-in-waiting at the Imperial Court, the novel chronicles the life and romances of Hikaru Genji, the son of an Emperor and his favourite concubine.

The library will be spotlighting Japanese fiction from a diverse array of authors and there is sure to be something to spark your interest. Titles available to borrow include

novels by Yukio Mishima, Yoko Ogawa, Keigo Hikashino, Banana Yoshimoto, Junichiro Tanizaki and many more.

There's a sniper out there. He's watching them and he knows exactly who they are. One of the group has a secret that the sniper is willing to kill for.







### The Gifts that Bind Us by Caroline O'Donoghue


A spellbinding supernatural teen drama - and sequel to All Our Hidden Gifts.


I colored it with colored pencils, markers, watercolor, and acrylic paint. I am proud of how it came out!

I added charcoal to the objects' shadows and dark areas and used white pencil for the highlights!





## **Extended Project Qualification**

## Year 12 students take an EPQ to help them prepare for further education



An Extended Project Qualification or EPQ is an A-level standard standalone qualification designed to extend and develop your students' abilities beyond the A-level syllabus and prepare for university or their future career.

- it's worth half an A-level (28 UCAS points)
- it's recognised by universities and employers as a fantastic supra-curricular activity
- many universities make lower A-level offers to students undertaking an EPQ.

The EPQ allows students to lead their own projects. Students get to plan and carry out research on a topic that they've chosen and isn't covered by their other qualifications. They can take inspiration from something touched on in class or something personal and unrelated to their studies. They then use this research to produce a written report and, in the case of practical projects, an artefact or a production.

By taking responsibility for the choice, design and decision making of an individual project (or an individual role in a group project) students:

- become more critical, reflective and independent learners
- develop and apply decision-making and problem-
- increase their planning, research, analysis, synthesis, evaluation and presentation skills
- learn to apply technologies confidently
- demonstrate creativity, initiative and enterprise.

Undertaking an EPQ can also deliver other benefits for students such as:

- improved A Level performance
- increasing student motivation by allowing them to study topics of personal interest
- enabling students to apply their new skills to other areas of study.



The students selected will then be given a supervisor who will mentor them through their independent projects. Students on the EPQ programme will attend weekly lessons on a variety of study skills.

The final deadline will be in October.

A group of around 30 students in Year 12 have just begun their projects.

"Reflecting back on my EPQ experience, I definitely did find it very useful. In particular, I enjoyed the freedom of the project, allowing me to research and present my work in my chosen way. However, there was also good balance of guidance throughout it which definitely provided great insight into how to write more academically, preparing me for university-style assignments.

But most importantly, I gained a qualification for researching a topic that I really enjoyed, acting as a great super-curricular activity. Therefore, I would thoroughly recommend the EPQ to others".

I chose to do my EPQ project on how trade impacted mythology in Eurasia. In my opinion, the best part of the EPQ programme was the independence and freedom awarded, not just with the main project but also with the choice of research topic. This meant that I could investigate a topic that I was passionate about and approach it how I wished. I was able to go more in depth on mythology and the nature of the ancient world (as a result helping me finalise my final choice of university course). While such a niche topic was difficult at times to research, the programme gave me the skills to overcome each obstacle.

These skills included time management, research planning, source analysis and presentation of my research. I have recently used all these skills for my A-Level History NEA and was able to quickly collate useful information and present it in an adequate fashion. Overall, the EPQ programme is an experience that I truly enjoyed and am thankful for doing.

I really enjoyed researching and discovering more about a topic I am so intrigued by. I improved my presenting skills as I had to present my research to an audience, I learnt Harvard-style referencing, and I bettered my academic writing skills as I had to write a non-fiction 5000-word report which is accurate, but without any plagiarism.

As well as the knowledge gained, I improved my planning techniques, which I believe will come useful in future projects.

The EPQ programme was a truly valuable academic experience. Through this, I could explore topics beyond the constraints of the A-Level Philosophy curriculum, such as Political Philosophy. It was the perfect opportunity for me to think independently by reading and evaluating academic texts. Although not directly related to the course I aspire to study at university, the transferrable skills I learnt were invaluable. These ranged from improving my time management to developing my critical source analysis.

I have already benefitted largely from the programme by applying footnoting and academic referencing skills to my A-Level History coursework. It has also been useful for mentioning in my personal statement, which sparked my interest in the role of women in History.

Overall, I would definitely recommend this programme to anyone interested in a topic beyond the A-Level curriculum! The skills gained are applicable to any higher educational endeavours, especially at university.

## Year 10's start their journey taking part in the Duke Of Edinburgh's Award

The current Year 10s have been given the opportunity to partake in the Duke of Edinburgh's award (DofE). It consists of four parts: a skill, a physical activity, volunteer work and a two-day expedition in the countryside. It was created with the aim of helping young people to improve their self esteem and build on their confidence.

We have only had two sessions so far, the first an introduction to what the award entails, and the second session was about forming our groups for the expedition and learning more about the award. For the physical activity you have to do one hour a week of an activity - for example basketball, swimming or even running - and you must do this for six months. For the skill you need to chose something you're interested in, for example photography or you can do something like taking up an instrument.

I have been given the opportunity to develop my writing as my skill, by documenting my experience of DofE and the weekly sessions. For volunteer work you can volunteer somewhere like a food bank or a Saturday school (like I am planning on doing). Each part of the award has to be verified by a teacher or a coach, if you are doing a sport.

I have enjoyed looking for places to carry out the parts for my award. For my skill I will be writing for an hour each week about my experiences during the DofE process. For my physical activity I will be playing basketball every Tuesday, which I have to do for 6 months for it to be valid for a DofE certificate.

## Free School Meals eligibility

Children are entitled to receive free school meals if they or their parents or guardians receive any of the benefits below.

- Universal Credit, provided they have an annual net earned income not exceeding £7,400 (£616.67 per month)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190, as assessed by HMRC
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

I don't currently claim free school meals - what does this mean for me?

If you think you might be eligible for free school meals, please see instructions here on how to check and apply.

I am currently claiming free school meals - what does this mean for me? Most people won't be affected by the new criteria. If you're currently claiming free school meals, but do not meet the new criteria, your child will continue to receive free school meals until the end of the Universal Credit rollout period. This will apply even if your earnings rise above the new threshold or if you stop being entitled to Universal Credit. The rollout period is currently scheduled to end on 31st March 2022. Once Universal Credit is fully rolled out, your child will keep their free school meal until the end of their current phase of education, i.e. primary or secondary.




# We're using Arbor's free Parent Portal and Arbor App

# Dropping off and collecting your daughter from school


