
# The Gym, Dance and Music show...






# Spotlight on International Fiction: Literature from the Caribbean


After a fascinating sojourn in Iran last half term, we are back on our literary trails once again. This half term we find ourselves in the Caribbean, one of the most culturally diverse regions of the world with a rich heritage of African origin as well as elements of British, Spanish, French and Dutch colonial heritage. The Caribbean consists of over 700 islands with thirteen sovereign island nations each boasting its own uniquely captivating geographical, political and literary landscape. We are therefore rather spoilt for choice in our exploration of the literature of the islands but will nevertheless do our best to sample a wide range of the delights on offer.

The library has books by Jamaican writer Marlon James, Trinidad-born Sam Selvon. Dominican poet and author Elizabeth Acevedo and many more. Some of the books are classics, others are award winning works by up-and-coming writers and there is much to enjoy and appreciate from the available selection.


In the Castle of My Skin by Barbadian novelist George Lamming is a moving autobiographical account of an innocent childhood overshadowed by the dark reality of oppression and tyranny. Kei Miller's Augustown is a lyrically told tale about the origins of Rastafarianism and the class struggle at the heart of political dissent in Jamaica. Where the Rhythm Takes You is a charming Young Adult retelling of Jane Austen's Persuasion with a tropical island setting. The Farming of Bones by renowned Haitian American writer Edwidge Danticat is set against the backdrop of the 1937 Parsley Massacre as it brutally unfolds, shattering the simple dreams of Annabelle Desir, a loyal maidservant to a Dominican family.


The anglophone literature of the islands offers perspectives from Caribbean writers living in the wake of colonial rule and more recently documents the experience of first- and second-generation migrants to America and Britain. Caribbean literature also has a strong tradition of magical realism which rivals that of neighbouring Latin America. Themes of alienation, endurance and self-determination are found alongside perennial themes of love, hope and self-discovery, lending the stories and poetry their own unique flavour. The library is proud to showcase a range of literature from the Caribbean and students are invited to drop in to take part in this literary adventure.













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
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
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



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









#### The Light in Everything by Katya Balen



# Sixth Form Trip

### **Cervantes Theatre Trip**



On the 30th of March, as A-Level Spanish students, we had an incredible opportunity to visit the Cervantes Theatre in London. We got to see an insightful performance of La Casa De Bernarda Alba, a play written by Federico Garcia Lorca, a dramatist and one of Spain's most celebrated playwrights. The play provides insight into the extreme repression that women experienced in Andalusia just before the outbreak of the Spanish civil war in 1936. The play centres around Bernarda who is a matriarch and exerts absolute power and control over her five daughters after the death of her second husband by imposing a mourning period of eight long years. The story follows the complex interactions between the five sisters and the emerging jealousies by exploring themes like sexual freedom, repression, and gender roles. My favourite part about the play is Lorca's incorporation of historical, sociological, and literary elements which were all interpreted so well in the performance that we had the pleasure of seeing. The set, the costumes and the acting made the





performance so moving and emotional, especially with the tragic ending in the final act. I was mesmerised by the acting of the main character, Bernarda, as she truly reflected the dominant and obsessive woman that Lorca depicted her to be. Overall, the play was truly insightful and an extremely valuable experience, especially leading up to our A-Level exams where we have to write an essay based on the themes or characters.


After the play, we had an incredible opportunity to explore London by seeing some fascinating historical areas in Southwark. We visited the Crossbones Cemetery which is a hidden gem and commemorates prostitutes and homeless people who suffered the judgements of society during the Middle Ages. This was thought-provoking and hearing of this atrocity made us appreciate the all-inclusive society that we live in today. After seeing this site, Mrs Ortega guided us to Borough Market and seeing the array of international foods allowed us to appreciate the scope of multi-culturalism we are blessed to have in London. We also visited a small Spanish shop, which sold purely Spanish goods like Spanish meats and wines, and this provided a stimulating insight into Spanish culture. My favourite part was the walk along the Southbank, allowing us to appreciate the views of London, such as St Paul's Cathedral. We had the pleasure of discovering more historical sites like the ruins of Winchester Palace, which was one of the largest and most important buildings to house bishops in Medieval London. We walked by the Clink Prison Museum too which is one of England's oldest prions mainly used for offences like treason. Seeing Southwark Cathedral was remarkable, given that it is one of the only remaining Catholic cathedrals in England. We captured some impressive pictures of the breathtaking views of the cathedral alongside the Shard. We then took a quick stop to see the Ramadan lights, going into Piccadilly Circus, which was an extraordinary experience, as the display was wonderful, especially the lanterns. Overall, the historical sites that we saw during the trip were so fascinating from the perspective of a historian and exploring the history of Southwark made me keen to continue exploring hidden gems in London.

# Count On Us Maths Challenge...

The Count on Us Maths challenge 2023 is a unique maths tournament for students in Years 7, 8 and 9 across London, which aims to improve confidence and fluency in maths. Students practise in school and compete in an exciting maths competition against their peers with the aim of reaching the final in late June, which is held at a prestigious location.

Five students were selected to represent the school in the regional heats of the tournament on Wednesday, 10th of May. The girls trained for the event with a range of activities providing different and unusual ways to develop curriculumfocused skills. The mathematical topics covered included stats and probability, geometry, numbers, and algebra.

The tournament consists of 5 rounds: The Game of Hedgehog, Data-Chart-Statistics, Gridlines Geometry, the 24@Game, and the Algebraic problem-solving round. It will encourage them to see maths as more than calculations but also as something that requires the problem-solving skills of strategy and resilience.

Fibonacci is credited with introducing the sequence to Europe and he also introduced the Hindu-Arabic 10-digit place value that we use today (fun fact!).

We're thrilled to have formed our 'Healing Hearts Team', a group of staff trained in mental health and wellbeing strategies. These members of staff are available to connect with and speak to students, offering invaluable support and guidance. This is a significant step towards fostering a nurturing and understanding atmosphere for our girls.

#### **Mental Health Support**

Our ongoing support includes our PSHE curriculum, Wise Thoughts conversations, sports, extra-curricular clubs, and the invaluable presence of our NHS Educational Mental Health Practitioner, Emma, two trained counsellors, and our student Wellbeing & Mental Health Ambassadors.

For additional resources, consider the Headspace and Calm apps, meditation MP3s in the Student Wellbeing and Mental Health Teams channel, or books such as "Mindfulness: Finding Peace in a Frantic World" by Professor Mark Williams.

#### Govox- A Pathway to Understanding

Our innovative trial of the Govox wellbeing survey platform has been going very well. This unique tool isn't a mandatory chore for students to fill out each month, but rather a channel for our students to communicate their feelings, from the heights of joy to being down in the dumps. With this technology, students receive personalised wellbeing advice and resources based on their responses to the survey, allowing us to make more strategic and focused interventions.


#### Mental Health Awareness week

To wrap up, I'd like to share two quotes on mental health. Richard Burton, in his 'Anatomy of Melancholy' (1621), suggests that staying active can help alleviate melancholy.

"As fern grows in untilled grounds, and all manner of weeds, so do gross humours in an idle body...They that are idle are far more subject to melancholy than such as are conversant or employed about any office or business."

And the Stoic philosopher Epictetus advises, "The first job in life is this. To distinguish between externals I cannot control, and the choices I make about them that I do control."

# Free School Meals eligibility

Children are entitled to receive free school meals if they or their parents or guardians receive any of the benefits below.

- Universal Credit, provided they have an annual net earned income not exceeding £7,400 (£616.67 per
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190, as assessed by HMRC
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

I don't currently claim free school meals - what does this mean for me?

If you think you might be eligible for free school meals, please see instructions here on how to check and apply.

I am currently claiming free school meals - what does this mean for me? Most people won't be affected by the new criteria. If you're currently claiming free school meals, but do not meet the new criteria, your child will continue to receive free school meals until the end of the Universal Credit rollout period. This will apply even if your earnings rise above the new threshold or if you stop being entitled to Universal Credit. The rollout period is currently scheduled to end on 31st March 2022. Once Universal Credit is fully rolled out, your child will keep their free school meal until the end of their current phase of education, i.e. primary or secondary.
