Award winning author Chris Priestley

We were very excited to welcome award-winning author Chris Priestley to Bentley Wood High School. Chris has written over 30 books covering a wide range of genre from historical fiction to young adult books and he has also enjoyed a successful career as an illustrator. His illustrations have featured in The Economist and The Independent, and his books have been translated into several languages. He is best known for his horror stories for children and, with Halloween around the corner, it was the perfect occasion to have him visit the school to talk about his life and work.

Chris spent the day talking to our students in years 7, 8 and 9 about his background and the experiences that led him to his chosen career of writing fiction. The girls had lots of questions for him, and it was lovely to see their genuine interest and curiosity about the world of publishing and the process of becoming a writer. We hope that the experience has inspired our girls to follow the advice Chris shared of having the courage to follow their passion when choosing their future careers and not being daunted by the challenges ahead.

After lunch, 30 lucky students were selected to take part in a story writing workshop, where Chris Priestley talked to them about the creative process behind writing a scary story. The girls had fun planning a scary story set in a library and they enjoyed exploring the idea of what inspires fear in the reader. It was an enjoyable and inspirational day and we look forward to welcoming Chris back to visit Bentley Wood in the future.

Spotlight on International Fiction: Literature from Algeria

Our last stop on our tour of world literature is Algeria, a place which over the centuries has produced literature in Latin, Spanish, Berber and its main languages of French and Arabic. The country's eventful history is mirrored in its vast and panoramic literature which offers a wealth of political and social commentary. Algeria also boasts its own unique tradition of ritualistic and divinatory poetry known as Buqalah which evolved into a form of feminist expression and cultural resistance in the colonial era of the country's history.

The library has translations of several Algerian classics and some critically acclaimed contemporary novels for students to gain an insight into the country's culture and history as well as the dominant social concerns of its people over different periods of time. Featured writers include Faiza Guene, Assia Djebar, Mouloud Feraoun, Ahlam Mosteghanemi and Mohammed Dib to name just a few.


Boualem Sansal's *Harraga* is a heart-breaking tale of the friendship between two very different women who become allies in their determination to survive their brutal circumstances. *What the Day Owes the Night* by Yasmina Khadra is an epic love story which deals with the themes of identity and the notion of fighting fate by carving one's own fortune.

The Earthquake by Tahir Wattar is about the religious hypocrisy embodied by a man who is desperate to dodge the land reforms being introduced by Algeria's new socialist government. In Tahar Djaout's *The Last Summer of Reason*

a bookseller resists the totalitarianism that threatens to obliterate his country's rich literary heritage.

Our travels across the world of international fiction have sadly come to an end for now but we hope it has been an enriching experience for the students who availed the opportunity to read books from our range of Japanese, Iranian and Caribbean fiction this year. We also hope that it has inspired students to continue to form a deeper and more meaningful understanding of other cultures by engaging with their art in all its forms of expression.

Summer Reads


Warrior Girl Unearthed by Angeline Boulley



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

Year 7 History Trip to Windsor Castle

On the 5th of June, all Year 7s went to visit Windsor Castle as part of their history curriculum on Castles and William the Conqueror. Students had the chance to explore the grounds and take part in two workshops about the history of Windsor Castle since 1066 and the role of a knight in the medieval ages. After that, we had a further look around the grounds and the castle itself, but unfortunately, we weren't allowed to take pictures inside, which was a massive disappointment.











The following day, we went to Checkpoint Charlie and the Palace of Tears, a key transport spot used during the Cold War which highlighted hardships faced by individuals wanting to travel from East to West Berlin.

The rest of the day was spent at various museum exhibitions and guided tours of the Topography of Terror, German resistance, and the Reichstag. It was very enlightening to hear all the stories by our very knowledgeable guides. Walking to the top of the Reichstag building also allowed us to see the beauty of Berlin from above!

Our last day was incredibly moving as we visited the

Sachsenhausen Concentration Camp, it was an eye-opening experience as we were able to witness the harsh conditions faced during the Holocaust. We then had a last-minute shopping spree in the Berlin Mall for souvenirs and presents and then made our way home.

Berlin is a beautiful city, full of history. It was a lovely trip in which it gave us the opportunity to to practice our German and also make friends throughout the school!

Engaging geography and science themed trips

Bentley Priory River Trips

Throughout this half term, Year 8 classes have visited the stream in Bentley Priory, to conduct an investigation about how a river changes as it moves downstream, as the culmination of their Rushing Rivers unit. Students get a taste of university life

Year 9 attend Goldsmiths, University of London for Scholars Graduation Event

The Scholars Programme helps students develop the knowledge, skills and confidence to progress to the most competitive universities.

The programme is available to state schools across England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland. It is structured around seven tutorials, and pupils also attend a graduation event at a partner university to speak with current undergraduates and learn about university life.

Students work towards completing a challenging final assignment which is marked and moderated using university grades. Placements at schools take place in autumn, spring and summer terms, with each lasting around eight weeks.

Here is a student's experience of the Scholars Programme:

The Scholars Programme was such an amazing experience for all of us. Having this experience end meant that we had one last day to conclude our course. This was our graduation ceremony and was held at Goldsmiths, University of London. During the day, we got a tour of the university, had a Q&A session, and received our certificates!! Whilst receiving our certificates, Mahi and I delivered a speech, and we were both very grateful to be able to take part and share our course with the other schools.

During the speech we mentioned what topic our course was on (Inside #10) and we also read short extracts from our final essays.

Capital L is an organisation of universities, led by SOAS and the University of Westminster in partnership with Queen Mary, UCL, King's College London and The Open University. We were shown a statistic that those who are bilingual earn 5-20% more than the average salary for their roleshowing languages are the key to opening many doors for yourself.

Year 8 Careers Morning:

The morning provided Year 8 girls with the opportunity to listen to and question speakers from a variety of professions about their occupation. They included a medical doctor, a chef, an engineer, a midwife, an artist/writer, a computer scientist, an educational psychologist and a lawyer.

Each speaker shared their own personal story about their journey into their occupation, with the idea that students would more likely remember a story than lots of information about a job. Medicine was again the most popular choice which indicates that girls are motivated by both altruism and by culture, family and status.

The intention behind this event is that young people will be encouraged to explore the world of work beyond the familiar jobs that they know and to find out about the variety of jobs that they could do across sectors based on their subject choices at GCSE.

Engagement with universities and careers at Bentley Wood Careers Fair

The Bentley Wood Careers Fair 2022 was organised by Education Development Trust who gathered employers, universities and colleges to the event held on 6th October 2022. The atmosphere was excellent with many of the girls eager to speak to the variety of visitors in attendance.

The Year 12 students appeared to engage with all of the employer organisations with many wanting to discuss apprenticeships as an alternative career pathway, they also discussed degree courses with Brunel, Royal Holloway and University of West London. Some were eager to learn about digital animation careers with Escape studios whose alumni have worked on many of the Marvel films

Year 11 students appeared more willing to participate by wearing police helmets and specialist equipment that they brought along. They spoke to Harrow college and Hammersmith and West London colleges about the different vocational courses available to study and to the different employers from the British Army, Royal Air Force and a variety of construction businesses including McGinley and Clancy group.

Harrow Law Centre presence meant that those young people interested in law careers were able to find out about an organisation that serves the wider community through legal representation in social welfare law. The job centre representative provided information about apprenticeships in the civil service and working across all government departments which increased awareness to all the girls of the importance of public service roles.

Opportunity to complete LAMDA exams

Roman Myths Tuesday 11th July 2023

Classics and Drama put on our annual outdoor event in the gorgeous grounds of Bentley Wood with the focus this year on Roman Mythology.

Roman mythology developed from the stories that the ancient Greeks created. These stories tried to explain situations and circumstances that they did not understand, such as the origins of the world, or why natural disasters occurred.

The stories the Romans continued to tell, spread as far as their empire did; from Briton, to Northern Africa and into modern day Turkey. It is from these stories that literature continued to evolve. Writers that we cannot imagine as never existing have been inspired by stories that were told over 2 thousand years ago; writers such as Shakespeare, John Keats, Mary Shelley, Rick Riordan, JK Rowling, Tolkien and Margaret Atwood to name but a few.

Mythology back then was not definitive and just as modern

writers put their own ideas and spins on wellknown ancient mythology, so did the Romans themselves.

Ovid was a Roman poet who gave voices to women in Greek myth who were largely forgotten, or not focused on by the Greeks. Virgil wove in a tragic tale of love between the Roman hero Aeneas and the African Queen Dido into his Roman epic, the Aeneid.

Mythological tales are ever changing, they have no boundaries and because of this they are everlasting. They act as mirrors that reflect the society they are being told in and the commentaries that our year 12 Classical Civilisation students gave after each performance hopefully provided much food for thought for the audience.

This year's performance was started off by a surprise juggling act from our very own Mr Farquhar! He wowed our audience with a special performance that ended with fire and truly warmed the audience up!

The cast were largely made up of students from lower down in the school and they put on three incredible performances of *Pyramus* and *Thisbe, Pandora's Jar* in Latin, and *Theseus* and the Minotaur.






Count On Us Maths Challenge...

United Kingdom Mathematics Trust



Art in Maths...

This autumn tree math craft is a fun way to celebrate the colours of autumn with a mathematical theme. Our year 7 students made this triangle tree using coloured tissue paper while working on the mathematical concepts that underpin triangular shapes. This maths activity is a visually impactful approach for students to appreciate the spatial and geometrical properties of triangles as they create art with a variety of colours and sizes of a single shape.

Fibonacci Sequence

Year 7s this term learnt about the Fibonacci number sequence. This a STEAM art task which encourages students to apply their knowledge of a concept in creating a fabulous piece of art! The Fibonacci sequence follows the rule that each number is equal to the sum of the preceding

two numbers. The sequence, which is found frequently in nature, is named after 12th century mathematician, Leonardo Fibonacci.

It must be noted that Fibonacci did not "discover" the sequence; the number sequence had been part of Hindu-Arabic mathematics for centuries. Fibonacci is credited with introducing the sequence to Europe and he also introduced the Hindu-Arabic 10-digit place value that we use today (fun fact!).







National Numeracy Week...

One of the best ways to encourage young people to feel positive about numbers is to make them feel confident in themselves. Our school took part in the National Numeracy Week 2023; it was a week of fun mathematical activities for years 7 to 9. We celebrated the importance of numbers for children and adults, inspiring them to improve their numeracy, something which in the long run is guaranteed to open up opportunities and lead to brighter futures.

Here are some of the fun activities that were running all week:

Maths Treasure Hunt: The treasure hunt was lots of fun and at the same time it encouraged leadership and communication. Teamwork was also a vital component as the girls had to work in groups to solve the maths puzzles. Congratulations to the winning team 7KPO who found the maths treasure & celebrated their achievement!

Numeracy Wise Thoughts: "Wise thoughts" are a regular feature in form time, affording students the opportunity to reflect on thoughts and ideas across a range of subjects and from a variety of viewpoints. During Numeracy Week we wanted the students to focus on how maths can be involved in everyday life, with the aim of discovering areas that they might initially not realise involve maths. A year of engagement with science: Year 7 Science Club

Science Club Science Club is a weekly experience where Year 7 sign up and take part in various interactive experiments. We can make or build things like rockets or lip-balm. We can do dissections, of hearts, lungs kidneys or eyes. We can experiment with acids and carbonates to make a rainbow of colours in neutralisation reactions. Dissecting a chicken



Science Club: Students get messy making slime

On 13 January we got our hands really sticky and made some slime! Students were able to see a chemical reaction right in front of their eyes.

This week we had numerous excited Year 7s who were ready to get their hands really sticky and make some slime! Given clear and coherent instructions by Mr Koyejo, the students were able to set off and were limitless in making and mixing colours and ingredients. This experiment allowed the girls to understand the type of chemical reactions that can occur and why - in this case the polyvinyl alcohol found in PVA glue reacts with the borate ions in bicarbonate of soda when mixed with contact lens solution. These are household items so everyone can give it a try! As always, paying attention to health and safety, students and staff worked efficiently together to clean up and get home for the weekend

Creating static electricity at Science Club

In science club, we learned about static electricity and how it can be used in various applications. We performed several experiments to demonstrate the principles of static electricity, such as rubbing a ruler with a cloth and then using it to see water bend or watching your ruler follow the direction you want it to go.

Bar Mock Trial Competition: Year 12 Students experience a real court room trial

The bar mock trial competition is a popular event which is designed to give students an opportunity to gain experience in courtroom procedures. Teams of Year 12 students competed against each other by simulating a courtroom trial, taking on the roles of lawyers, witnesses, and other participants. In order to prepare for the competition, students had to carefully research and memorise the statements of witnesses and anticipate challenging questions that may be asked in the courtroom.

The London round of the competition, which was held at Snaresbrook Crown Court in East London, involved teams of students from a variety of schools across London competing against each other in a series of trials.

The teams were given two hypothetical cases to prepare for, and they spent time researching and rehearsing their arguments and presentations.

On the day of the competition, each team presented their case in front of the judges and a courtroom audience, with the lawyers presenting opening and closing statements, examining and cross-examining witnesses, and making legal arguments. Mental Health and Wellbeing Updates from the Bentley Woods

At Bentley Wood, we're committed to supporting your daughter's emotional well-being and mental health, alongside her academic success and personal development, to the best of our ability. As we enter the summer break, we want to share with you some strategies, developments, and advice for your daughters (and you).



Self-Care:

Self-care is about what you can do to help yourself feel better or to keep yourself feeling good. It's a way that we can look after our own mental health and wellbeing.

Everyone's approach to self-care will look different. What works for you might not work for others. There are lots of different self-care strategies so you can try out different ones until you find something that works for you.

The **Anna Freud** centre has produced a resource that walks young people through a series of steps, helping them create a detailed self-care plan that works for them.

The plan helps young people identify activities that they can use to support their mental health. It's adaptable on a weekly or monthly basis, so that it can fit differing schedules or priorities.

The suggested activities in the plan are split into different categories, including:

- Physical activities ideas include eating a healthy, diet, and spending time away from technology.
- Emotional activities Writing down good things we do as a reminder to be less hard on ourselves, developing the 'right' friendships, namely, those that are supportive in positive ways.
- Social activities such as creating a playlist with friends, joining a local youth group.
- Practical activities suggestions such as organising your day (nothing makes you feel less mentally 'cluttered' than writing down a list!), and setting realistic goals to give a sense of purpose and direction.

We will continue to offer a wide range of support for your daughter at Bentley Wood, including our PSHE curriculum, Wise Thoughts discussions, sports and extracurricular clubs. Some examples follow.

- We introduced our 'Healing Hearts Team' this year.
 They are a group of staff trained in mental health and wellbeing strategies. These members of staff are available to connect with and speak to students, offering invaluable support and guidance.
- We continue to have an NHS Educational Mental Health Practitioners (EMHP), Emma, working with us.
- We have a fully-trained Senior Mental Health Lead who is a Senior Leader, in line with best Governmentendorsed practice, and this means we have support from the Harrow Mental Health Support Team. (MHST)
- We have two Counsellors in each week.


- We have our own student Wellbeing & Mental Health Ambassadors to lead on whole-school initiatives and offer advice to fellow students.
- For additional wellbeing and mindfulness resources, consider the Headspace and Calm apps, meditation MP3s in the Student Wellbeing and Mental Health Teams channel, or books such as "Mindfulness: Finding Peace in a Frantic World" by Professor Mark Williams.
- This year we trialled an innovative new wellbeing survey platform called 'Govox'. This technology-assisted approach sends out bespoke wellbeing advice to your daughters, allowing them to check in and let us know how they're doing. We will be rolling this out to more year groups next year to assist our bespoke support for your daughter.

- Wait until your child is of an appropriate age before agreeing to which social networking sites they may join.
- Assist your child with helping to create their profile and configuring their privacy settings.
- Make sure you're aware of any changes in your privacy settings, and change them as needed.
- If you find any bad language or pictures, use the support, reporting and assistance tools.
- Help keep your children safe online by teaching them how to block or ignore individuals on games and social networking sites, as well as when to do so.
- Teach your child that they should never disclose personal information, such as their password, address, or school
- Determine how long they may use various websites each day, together.
- Maintain a relationship with the same social media platforms to keep an eye on things.
- Make sure children understand that those they meet online may not be who they claim to be, and that meeting them could be very dangerous.

Staying safe over the summer

We wish you a safe summer break. The School's reception will be open over the summer from 9am-4pm if you have any safeguarding concerns.

Advice for Students:

- Talk to a trusted adult if anyone says or does anything that worries or frightens you. A trusted adult might be a family member or please contact the school – someone will be there to support you.
- Always tell a trusted adult where you are going and what time you will return.
- Don't lend your mobile phone to anyone unless it is an emergency
- Don't let anyone online trick you into doing something or sending pictures against your wishes.
- **Don't share** any passwords/login information keep them private and use complex passwords, too.
- Never give personal information to any person you don't know.

Safety and your mobile phone:

- Speak to a parent/trusted adult about who you are connecting with and not to purchase anything online without gaining an adult's permission first.
- Age Ratings on Apps are there to keep you safe.
- Only connect online with friends and family you know in the physical world and not to accept 'friend play request' from strangers.
- Don't put up with abusive texts, photos or video. Show them to an adult and report them.
- You should always speak to a trusted adult if you see or hear anything online that makes you feel scared or uncomfortable and to never arrange to meet someone who they have met online.
- When sharing images: you need consent to take and share images/videos of others. People also need your consent to take and share your image.
- If an image shows the private parts of a person who is under 18; it IS an indecent image: It is an **offence** if you: save it, share it, keep it, print it, forward it, show it.

Free School Meals eligibility

Children are entitled to receive free school meals if they or their parents or guardians receive any of the benefits below.

- Universal Credit, provided they have an annual net earned income not exceeding £7,400 (£616.67 per month)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190, as assessed by HMRC
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

I don't currently claim free school meals - what does this mean for me?

If you think you might be eligible for free school meals, please see instructions here on how to check and apply.

I am currently claiming free school meals - what does this mean for me? Most people won't be affected by the new criteria. If you're currently claiming free school meals, but do not meet the new criteria, your child will continue to receive free school meals until the end of the Universal Credit rollout period. This will apply even if your earnings rise above the new threshold or if you stop being entitled to Universal Credit. The rollout period is currently scheduled to end on 31st March 2022. Once Universal Credit is fully rolled out, your child will keep their free school meal until the end of their current phase of education, i.e. primary or secondary.




We're using Arbor's free Parent Portal and Arbor App


Dropping off and collecting your daughter from school
