Year 8 students interact with tropical rainforest animals

ZooLab popped in to see year 8 students this half term. They are an ethically responsible organisation that uses rescued pets, or those that are bred in captivity, to demonstrate the wonderful attributes of some species that have adapted to living in tropical rainforests.

Students had fun time learning about animal adaptations and made specific links to the rainforest environment ahead of their learning in Geography lessons. The key objectives were:

- Define tropical rainforest
- Determine the locations of tropical rainforests
- Explore the forest floor, under storey, canopy and emergent layer
- Discuss adaptations of rainforest animals

Students had the opportunity to hold some of the fascinating creatures and interact with the speaker, whilst learning.

The session allowed them to consider which layer of the rainforest the animal thrived in and how it survived.

Animals included: Giant African snails; tarantulas; corn snakes; Madagascar hissing cockroaches; millipedes; scorpions; tree frogs and even a gerbil!

Needless to say, the interaction was delightful and scary for some, but it was fantastic to see so many students challenge themselves and get involved.

Castle Competition: Year 7 learn more about Norman history

Students create amazing motte-and-bailey and medieval stone keep castles

Last term, all students in Year 7 learnt about William the Conqueror and his takeover of England in 1066. After winning the Battle of Hastings, William was faced with several problems regarding how to maintain the power of this new land he had just conquered.

He dealt with these problems of finances, loyalty and trust by initiating the Harrying of the North which squashed rebellions in the North through force, creating a feudal system which gave everyone in society a role and responsibility and coordinating the Domesday Book which was an account of what people owned and informed William about the taxes he was going to collect.

The final problem he had to solve was how he was going to showcase his power. He did this through building castles such as a motte-and-bailey and stone keep castle.

Year 7 were given the challenge of building these castles and the top 6 were placed in the library for the whole school to see. The whole school then voted for the ones they thought were the most realistic.

Ms Bharj

Jasmin

In order to have a vision of what I wanted my castle to look like, I used inspiration from Harlech castle in Wales to see the structure of a medieval castle. I made my project by using materials such as cardboard and some skewers to create the accessories such as stairs.

I started by mapping out the base to roughly locate the individual walls and towers and then started to measure and cut the pieces of cardboard. It was challenging to get the measurements right because otherwise it wouldn't fit together the way I was hoping for, but I was successful.

After I got all the parts together, I stuck tiny cut up pieces of cardboard to create the texture of bricks and then started to paint them. I wanted a more eerie look, so I went for a darker shade of grey and added lighter & darker strokes to it to show the different types of stone used. When this was all done, I could finally stick the parts together and finish any embellishments or touch ups as well as adding lights. I am really happy with how it turned out.

Our castle was inspired by the medieval stone keep castle. We used lots of materials such as cardboard, cloth, wooden lollipop sticks and string. It took us 2 weeks to complete our masterpiece. We used paint to give our castle colour and we tried to include lots of features that the actual stone keep castle would have had such as turrets and a drawbridge. We are both really proud of our finished product.

Victoria

I started with an idea - I wanted to build a motte-and-bailey castle because of the interesting design and how it was first used by Willian the Conqueror to become King of England. I thought about what materials were available and how it would be accurate to real motte-and-bailey castles.

I concluded with using popsicle sticks for the majority of the palisade and lining the buildings and keep. I used foam and Styrofoam to build the base of the castle and the motte. Thin pieces of foam were placed on the case and in the ditch to add colour and a realistic effect.

There was a lot of trial and error involved in the whole project - especially building the motte. With some resilience and hard work, everything managed to work out in the end. I am very pleased with the end result showing the aspects of a motte-and-bailey castle.







Geography field trips this term

Students gain valuable investigation skills on field trip to Somerset

Our geography class went on a residential trip to Somerset, and it was amazing. We spent the first day in Watchet and looked at the topic 'Place' in geography. Place describes the physical and human characteristics of any location on Earth.

There was a place in Watchet called East Quay which was regenerated and had lots of things to do inside, such as going to a restaurant, the paper mill and the local shops.

On the second day we went to Porlock Bay. This was a beach that had beautiful scenery. We looked at how the gradient and rock size changes over the coast. We then went up the cliff at around sunset and made a field sketch of what we could see.

On the third day we went to Minehead and did a coastal management investigation on the different management strategies which would best suit the area and which ones have been efficient. After the investigation we headed back home!

What we got out of the trip is, skills that we can use for our own investigations. I now know what type of methods to use to investigate an area and in this I had met and proved my hypothesis for our fieldwork.

This will also help me in my NEA becasue of all the primary data that I had collected. I would recommend going on any trips that have to do with your studies as it gives you a broader knowledge of the topic and makes you understand the work better.

A level geography students study the carbon and water cycle at Epping Forest

Our A-level geography class went on a field trip to Epping Forest in order to enhance our understanding of the water cycle and discover more about the carbon and water cycle.

We started by focussing on the carbon cycle and firstly created hypotheses and carried out an investigation to find out the how different species of trees in our natural deciduous woodland, sequester carbon and regulate our climate.

We were able to collect data from the woodland and use the quantitative data to make further calculations and analyse data. We considered the height of trees using a clinometer and tape measure and then we measured the circumference. Combined measures from our collection allowed us to deduce the biomass and financial value of the trees, respectively.

During the second half of the day we investigated the water cycle. We were able to observe the functions of this cycle from a macro (global scale) to a micro scale. We used models to simulate surface runoff comparisons between an urban and natural environment; and we considered interception, and infiltration rates from other simulations.

Finally, we were able to compare the composition of soils at three different locations and analyse how geology and in particular, permeability varies and impacts fluvial landscapes.

We were then able to combine both key elements of the day by field sketching and annotating carbon and water cycle factors in the Epping Forest environment.

Overall, this fieldtrip was insightful and beneficial in learning the dynamic relationships between carbon and water.


My Life as a Chameleon by Diana Anyakwo







Scholastic offer the best of these trending books in combination with literary classics, which is why we are proud to host two book fairs every year in collaboration with them.



Students were invited to propose a friendship between fictional characters from two different books of their choice, giving reasons why they believed the two characters would make great buddies.





The day finished with a couple of practical sessions that were led by the Brunel students and this is where the GCSE students started to apply their knowledge into practice.


There were able to try reflex tests, ACL checks, listening to each other's lungs and finally balance and senses challenges.

Disability instruments These were the items seized from those that required aid for their disability. It reminded us of the variety of people targeted by the Nazis, including those with even slight disabilities.

Outside of the barracks We walked through the barracks where ex-prisoners would live, with each one depicting a different aspect of the tragedy that occurred during the Holocaust. List of names This represented the millions of people that were killed in Auschwitz during the Holocaust, the pages were filled on both sides. The realisation of the sheer amount of people that were killed was truly eye opening.

A Level history students visit Poland to gain further insight into the Holocaust

To give further insight into the atrocities of Nazi Germany, Rabab and I (Nikita) were granted the opportunity to go to Poland for a daytrip with the lessons from Auschwitz Programme.

Part of our A-Level history course looks at the Nazi dictatorship in Germany and the expansion of their power throughout Europe; specifically in our 2nd year of content we look into the events leading up to, and during the Holocaust. As part of the programme we were initially expected to attend a pre-trip webinar that informed us of life for the Jews in Poland before Nazi occupation.

On the day of the trip we travelled early in the morning to Krakow, Poland and reached the town where the concentration camps were located. The town was once primarily populated by Polish Jews, and we were given the chance to visit an old synagogue that held memorabilia of pre-war life.

This was done to place an alternative emphasis on the people that were affected by the Holocaust, rather than the perpetrators. After this, we arrived at Auschwitz, the concentration camp, and had a guided tour around the barracks that made up the camp, with each one telling a story of the victims of the Holocaust. One barrack that particularly stood out to us was one that presented a list of names of people that were murdered at the camps.

After this we visited the infamous death camp and stood ourselves on the railways that were used to transport millions of Jews to it. We were able to visit the remains of the gas chambers, and learned much about the conditions that people were kept in during their short stay at Auschwitz Birkenau. A rabbi spoke to us, explaining the importance of learning about the Holocaust more than 70 years later, emphasising the prevalence of anti-Semitism in the current world.

The trip was incredibly saddening yet insightful, and gave us a new understanding of the true nature of the Holocaust and its victims. Not only did this enrich our comprehension of our A- Level content, but it also granted us a once in a lifetime opportunity to visit such a profound monument of history, from which we learned lessons that will stay with us for years to come.




Career guidance at Bentley Wood

This lack of a clear goal causes some worry, but they were reassured (80% of graduate jobs require any degree) that being open minded about what they could do as a job based on their personal qualities, strengths, skills and other interests broadened their options as they were not limited by a specific focus and that opportunities could be unlimited depending upon the sector that they want to work in.



Mental Health and Wellbeing Updates from the Bentley Woods

At Bentley Wood, we're committed to supporting your daughter's emotional well-being and mental health, alongside her academic success and personal development, to the best of our ability

As we enter the well-earned Christmas break, I wanted to share with you some strategies, developments, and advice for your daughters (and you). We want to help you, the very best we can, in fostering your daughter's resilience and emotional wellbeing.



Self-Care:

Self-care is about what you can do to help yourself feel better or to keep yourself feeling good. It's a way that we can look after our own mental health and wellbeing.

Everyone's approach to self-care will look different. What works for you might not work for others. There are lots of different self-care strategies so you can try out different ones until you find something that works for you.

The Anna Freud centre has produced a resource that walks young people through a series of steps, helping them create a detailed self-care plan that works for them. I wanted to share this with you again as it has great practical advice.

The plan helps young people identify activities that they can use to support their mental health. It's adaptable on a weekly or monthly basis, so that it can fit differing schedules or priorities.

The suggested activities in the plan are split into different categories, including:

- **Physical activities** ideas include eating a healthy, diet, and spending time away from technology.
- **Emotional activities** Writing down good things we do as a reminder to be less hard on ourselves, developing the 'right' friendships, namely, those that are supportive in positive ways.
- **Social activities** such as creating a playlist with friends, joining a local youth group.

• **Practical activities** – suggestions such as organising your day (nothing makes you feel less mentally 'cluttered' than writing down a list!), and setting realistic goals to give a sense of purpose and direction.

Stay Connected: Student Wellbeing and Mental Health Teams Channel

We often upload new resources, tips, and advice to the **Student Wellbeing and Mental Health Teams channel**. Here, you can find a repository of **videos**, **articles**, guided **meditations**, and more to help you and your daughter cope with stress and anxiety, and to become more resilient.



Mental Health Support at Bentley Wood

We will continue to offer a wide range of support for your daughter at Bentley Wood, including our PSHE curriculum, Wise Thoughts discussions, sports and extra-curricular clubs. Some examples follow.

• Our new 'Healing Hearts Team'. These are a group of staff trained in mental health and wellbeing strategies. These members of staff are available to connect with and speak to students, offering invaluable support and guidance.



We have a fully-trained **Senior Mental Health** Lead who is a Senior Leader, in line with best Governmentendorsed practice, and this means we have support from the H**arrow Mental Health Support Team. (MHST)**

- We have three **Counsellors in each week**, including a representative of the **Wish Centre.**
- We have our own student Wellbeing & Mental Health Ambassadors to lead on whole-school initiatives and offer advice to fellow students.
- For additional wellbeing and mindfulness resources, consider the Headspace and Calm apps, meditation MP3s in the Student Wellbeing and Mental Health Teams channel, or books such as "Mindfulness: Finding Peace in a Frantic World" by Professor Mark Williams.

Staying safe during the Christmas holidays

Advice for Students:

- Talk to a trusted adult if anyone says or does anything that worries or frightens you. A **trusted adult** might be a family member or please contact the school someone will be there to support you.
- Always tell a trusted adult where you are going and what time you will return.
- Don't lend your mobile phone to anyone unless it is an emergency
- Don't let anyone online trick you into doing something or sending pictures against your wishes.
- **Don't share** any passwords/login information keep them private and use complex passwords, too.
- Never give personal information to any person you don't know.

Safety and your mobile phone:

- Speak to a parent/trusted adult about who you are connecting with and not to purchase anything online without gaining an adult's permission first.
- Age Ratings on Apps are there to keep you safe.
- **Only** connect online with friends and family you know in the physical world and not to accept 'friend play request' from strangers.
- Don't put up with abusive texts, photos or video. Show them to an adult and report them.
- You should **always** speak to a trusted adult if you see or hear anything online that makes you feel **scared** or **uncomfortable** and to **never** arrange to meet someone who they have met online.
- When sharing images: **you need consent** to take and share images/videos of others. People also need your **consent** to **take** and **share** your image.
- If an image shows the private parts of a person who is under 18; it IS an indecent image: It is an **offence** if you: save it, share it, keep it, print it, forward it, show it.

Free School Meals eligibility

Children are entitled to receive free school meals if they or their parents or guardians receive any of the benefits below.

- Universal Credit, provided they have an annual net earned income not exceeding £7,400 (£616.67 per month)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190, as assessed by HMRC
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

I don't currently claim free school meals – what does this mean for me?

If you think you might be eligible for free school meals, please see instructions here on how to check and apply.

I am currently claiming free school meals – what does this mean for me? Most people won't be affected by the new criteria. If you're currently claiming free school meals, but do not meet the new criteria, your child will continue to receive free school meals until the end of the Universal Credit rollout period. This will apply even if your earnings rise above the new threshold or if you stop being entitled to Universal Credit. The rollout period is currently scheduled to end on 31st March 2022. Once Universal Credit is fully rolled out, your child will keep their free school meal until

the end of their current phase of education, i.e. primary or secondary.

Opportunity to complete LAMDA exams

We are nearing the end of our first term of LAMDA with the current students now preparing to complete their LAMDA graded exams before the end of this term.

I am happy to inform you that LAMDA will continue in the spring term as part of our enrichment programme, students will have an opportunity to work towards and complete LAMDA examinations. If you would like your daughter to take part, they will receive individual sessions with a qualified LAMDA tutor for students from the start of January, with an examination taking place in March/April.

What is LAMDA? London Academy of Dramatic Art is a wellknown establishment in qualifications in Speech of Verse & Prose, Acting, Musical Theatre and Public Speaking. It is well respected and recognised on a person's CV and offers UCAS points for Grade 6,7 & 8.

Working with the local **Stagecoach Stanmore & Harrow Weald** we are able to offer this opportunity at £150 for 10 sessions per term. LAMDA examinations will incur an extra fee. If your daughter is eligible for free school meals, then the lesson charge will be at a discounted price. Please express an interest using the email indicated below and speak with Mr Rankin, Head of Drama.

How will it work? One-to-one specialist teachers will work with the student to prepare for all aspects of the examination.

This is an extra commitment and sessions will be timetabled during lessons on a rota to avoid continuous disruption to a single subject.

The first session will explore which grade the student will be best suited to work towards. If you've done LAMDA before elsewhere but want to switch to us, let us know which grade they completed, and we can pick up on the next grade up.




Arbor
