
## **Politics Department Curriculum Overview**



## **Curriculum Overview**

Students of Politics firstly examine key features of UK Politics and Government. Component 1 explores Democracy and Participation, Political Parties, Electoral Systems and Voting Behaviour and the Media. Component 2 explores the UK Constitution, Parliament, the Prime Minister and Executive and evaluates the relationships between key Institutions. Year 12 Components are taught simultaneously.

Year 13 content deepens knowledge on core political Ideologies of Conservatism, Liberalism and Socialism as well as one non-core Political Ideology of Nationalism. Students also study Component 3- Global Politics, linking closely to International Relations. Students explore the phenomenon of globalization to evaluate the state of political, economic and environmental global governance from realist and liberalist perspectives. Students also explore the protection of Universal Human Rights, world power dynamics and regionalism.

Throughout the course students master the skills of critical thinking and undertake wider reading to complement their political awareness.
