Students get half price books at the Scholastic Book Fair




The Letter with the Golden Stamp by Onjali Q Rauf






You're Not Supposed to Die Tonight by Kalynn Bayron


In the Orbit of You by Ashley Schumacher



HOW DO I REGISTER TO VOTE?

To vote, you need to check your eligibility and register

https://www.gov.uk/register-to-vote

It only takes 5 minutes - you just need to fill in where you live, your date of birth, name, nationality and National Insurance number. You can register from 16 in England and Northern Ireland, and from 14 in Scotland and Wales.

Where do I find my National Insurance number - this should have been posted or emailed to you once you turned 16. If you have a job, it will be on your payslip. If you don't have it don't worry, you can register without it!





Sixth Formers learn about the importance of voting

Our Sixth Formers had the wonderful opportunity to hear from a member of the Politics Project about the importance of voting. This was a hot topic given our very recent local elections and the upcoming general elections later in the year.

With many of our Year 13 eligible to vote already and many more sixth formers becoming eligible later in the year, students were excited to soon have the opportunity to seek representation via their votes. Students had the opportunity to learn about how voting works with many registering to vote on the spot! Voting is extremely important as it is a way for the people to represent their views and have their voices heard. I learnt in an assembly about voting that the turnout in 18-24 year old was just over 40% compared to over 70% in over 65 year olds. It is really important to raise awareness in young people that their vote matters and that they have the ability to affect how the country is being run. We all had the chance to register to vote, but if you still have not done it, just scan the QR code and fill in the form. You must be over the age of 16.



Count On Us Secondary Maths Challenge HEAT Tournament at Hammersmith Academy



The Count On Us Secondary Maths Challenge is an exciting pan-London programme that engages students with maths games designed to challenge and inspire.

This is an initiative of the Jack Petchey Foundation and five Bentley Wood High School students were selected to represent our remarkable school on the 1st of May for this year's challenge. As a Numeracy Ambassador, I was privileged to participate in this inspiring tournament.

The Count on Us challenge consists of 5 rounds:

Hedgehog: a dice game using probability Data-Chart Analysis: a game using real - world statistics Grid Lines: a card game of geometry 24 Game: a fast-paced game of mental arithmetic Algebraic Problem Solving: a themed team game of algebra

Hedgehog was my personal favourite. This particular game tests your judgement of probability. As the game involves rolling a single dice, it might sound quite simple and come across as a game of luck.

However, on your turn you are allowed to keep rolling a die and adding up your score but with three extra rules. If you roll 1, then your turn is over. If you roll a 6 your turn ends, and you score nothing. Or you can choose to pass and score all of your dice rolls up to these points. The first school to score 31 points wins. We played as a team of five - our cooperation skills shone through as we excelled and won all four rounds.

Numeracy Passport Challenge




What's Your Money Personality?

Year 13 students watch Nursing Associate Degree Apprenticeship webinar

On 15th April 2024 North West London Hospital Trust Apprenticeship Team gave a webinar to some Year 13 Health and Social Care students about the Nursing Associate Degree Apprenticeship pathway.

The pathway offers students the opportunity to qualify as a Nursing Associate in 18 months. After a further year of experience, they can apply for a Nursing degree apprenticeship and qualify as a Registered Nurse in 18 months.

The Nursing Associate degree apprenticeship offers an ideal taster for a healthcare job, which is both personally fulfilling and academically challenging. Giving young people the opportunity to make informed career decisions without accumulating student debt.

Choosing this pathway may reduce the number of students not completing their nursing degree (1:8) and increase the number of students that go on and become nurses because of the experience, qualification and salary that they have received. Nursing Associate apprenticeships are advertised by hospitals on the NHS jobs website.



The Latin department organised a trip for our Year 10 class to visit the Roman site of Verulamium, better known to some as St Albans.




Orange Jackets: A fascinating talk on stage management

This is a way to identify students in need of a 'check-in', to deliver them bespoke wellbeing resources, and to take the pulse of how our students are feeling each half-term.

We email them a survey link each half-term, which they are asked to complete. Please do encourage your daughter to complete the survey each half-term. The next one goes out **Monday June 10th** (the second Monday back after half-term).

Whether she's on top of the moon, or down in the dumps, we want to know how she's doing.

Stay Connected: Student Wellbeing and Mental Health Teams Channel

We often upload new resources, tips, and advice to the **Student Wellbeing and Mental Health Teams channel**. Here, you can find a repository of **videos**, **articles**, guided **meditations**, and more to help you and your daughter cope with stress and anxiety, and to become more resilient.

Select Mental Health & Wellbeing Support at Bentley Wood

We will continue to offer a wide range of support for your daughter at Bentley Wood, including our PSHE curriculum, Wise Thoughts discussions, sports and extracurricular clubs. Some examples follow.

Our 'Healing Hearts Team'. These are a group of staff trained in mental health and wellbeing strategies. These members of staff are available to connect with and speak to students, offering support and guidance for low-level concerns.

We have a fully-trained **Senior Mental Health Lead** who is a Senior Leader, in line with best Government-endorsed practice, and this includes support from the **Harrow Mental Health Support Team.** (MHST)

We have a number of **Counsellors in each week**, including a representative from the **Wish Centre**, in case your daughter requires higher-level intervention than the Healing Hearts Team can provide.

We have our own student **Wellbeing & Mental Health Ambassadors** to lead on whole-school initiatives such as Wise Thoughts, wellbeing Teams tips, and be a friendly face if needed.

For additional wellbeing and mindfulness resources, consider the **Headspace** and **Calm** apps, meditation MP3s in the Student Wellbeing and Mental Health Teams channel, or books such as "Mindfulness: Finding Peace in a Frantic World" by Professor Mark Williams.

The Stoic philosopher Epictetus advises, "The first job in life is this. To distinguish between externals I cannot control, and the choices I make about them that I do control."




Year 13 help organise Criminology Club for younger students this term



Year 7 students have a fun lesson about static electricity


This term our Year 7s took part in a fun science lesson during Science Club where they learned all about static electricity and also undertook two fun experiments to explore the properties of static electricity using everyday objects.

The lesson started in a rather thrilling and spectacular fashion when a student volunteer was selected to demonstrate how a Van de Graaff generator causes a person's hair to stand on end. The student volunteer placed her hands on the sphere and as charge flowed into the student and through her hair, the similarly charged strands repelled each other. This created the dramatic "electrocuted" effect often depicted in animation and film.

The students then conducted two further experiments to consolidate their understanding of static electricity. In the first experiment they took plastic cones and rubbed them with a cloth. The negatively charged cones were then held next to a stream of water flowing from a tap. There were exclamations of amazement as the students observed the flowing water bend towards the plastic cones.

The last experiment involved making small figurines from tissue paper with their feet taped to the surface of the table. A plastic ruler which had been rubbed with a cloth was then passed over the tissue figures, making them rise as a result of the charge in the ruler attracting the tissue.

Science Club is a popular feature of Bentley Wood's broad enrichment calendar and it aims to harness the creativity and nurture the curiosity of our budding scientists. We look forward to more exciting experiments and stimulating learning experiences in Science Club next half term.








We're using Arbor's free Parent Portal and Arbor App

Arbor is a simple, smart and cloud-based MIS (Management Information System), which helps us work faster, smarter and more collaboratively as a school. The Arbor App and Parent Portal mean we can keep you informed about your child's life at school in a much more accessible way. Log into Arbor to see and update your child's information, get live updates and messages from the school.

The Parent Portal works on Google Chrome (computer or laptop) and you can download the Arbor App from the App Store or Google Play Store on your phone (Android 5.0; iOS 10.0 and upwards).



Staying safe

Advice for Students:

- Talk to a trusted adult if anyone says or does anything that worries or frightens you. A **trusted adult** might be a family member or please contact the school someone will be there to support you.
- Always tell a trusted adult where you are going and what time you will return.
- Don't lend your mobile phone to anyone unless it is an emergency
- Don't let anyone online trick you into doing something or sending pictures against your wishes.
- **Don't share** any passwords/login information keep them private and use complex passwords, too.
- Never give personal information to any person you don't know.

Safety and your mobile phone:

- Speak to a parent/trusted adult about who you are connecting with and not to purchase anything online without gaining an adult's permission first.
- Age Ratings on Apps are there to keep you safe.
- Only connect online with friends and family you know in the physical world and not to accept 'friend play request' from strangers.
- Don't put up with abusive texts, photos or video. Show them to an adult and report them.
- You should always speak to a trusted adult if you see or hear anything online that makes you feel scared or uncomfortable and to never arrange to meet someone who they have met online.
- When sharing images: **you need consent** to take and share images/videos of others. People also need your **consent** to **take** and **share** your image.
- If an image shows the private parts of a person who is under 18; it IS an indecent image: It is an **offence** if you: save it, share it, keep it, print it, forward it, show it.

Anyone can use the Internet. Not everyone is who they say they are and some people are not nice.

Free School Meals eligibility

- Children are entitled to receive free school meals if they or their parents or guardians receive any of the benefits below.
- Universal Credit, provided they have an annual net earned income not exceeding £7,400 (£616.67 per month)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190, as assessed by HMRC
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

I don't currently claim free school meals - what does this mean for me?

If you think you might be eligible for free school meals, please see instructions here on how to check and apply.

I am currently claiming free school meals – what does this mean for me? Most people won't be affected by the new criteria. If you're currently claiming free school meals, but do not meet the new criteria, your child will continue to receive free school meals until the end of the Universal Credit rollout period.

This will apply even if your earnings rise above the new threshold or if you stop being entitled to Universal Credit. The Universal Credit rollout is currently expected to complete in March 2025. Once Universal Credit is fully rolled out, your

child will keep their free school meal until the end of their current phase of education, i.e. primary or secondary.




Dropping off and collecting your daughter from school
