




Bletchley Park trip

Year 8 students enjoy a captivating and immersive experience at Bletchley Park

Our school trip to Bletchley Park was a captivating experience! We began by visiting one of the many huts in the park, where we inspected the Bombe, a device created by British cryptologists, who are experts in the study of codes.

The primary function of the Bombe was to discover the daily settings of the Enigma machines used by various German military networks. After this, we watched a short introductory video that explained how the device was used to decrypt German communications during World War II. We also used activity booklets that detailed the different parts of the Bombe machine.

Following the video and our visit to the first hut, we had a chance to browse the gift shop, which offered a wide array of goodies!

We then proceeded to several other huts, where we had the opportunity to see Alan Turing's office. In this space, we viewed his typewriter and other items he used during his work, providing us with an intriguing insight into the environment where this renowned codebreaker and mathematician spent his time deciphering codes.

We participated in a hands-on workshop after taking in all the breath-taking historical sights. Here, we attempted to decode messages similar to those used at Bletchley Park, but decoding messages from World War II proved to be quite a challenge! Additionally, we learned how to use a cypher wheel to decode various messages that were provided to us.

Later, we enjoyed a guided tour led by Stuart, who gave us a fascinating glimpse into the daily lives of the individuals—predominantly women—who worked at Bletchley Park.

His narrative allowed us to imagine their routines, living conditions, and the crucial, secretive work they performed. He described the intense atmosphere of concentration especially when listening for radio signals and the collaboration that took place, emphasizing the vital role played by the people of Bletchley Park. The day concluded with a closer look inside the mansion, filled with beautiful artwork and extensive bookcases.

We left Bletchley Park with a deeper understanding of the Enigma machine, the complex art of codebreaking, and the invaluable contributions made by the remarkable individuals who worked there, whose efforts significantly impacted the course of history.

Bletchley Park: Year 8 get code cracking and discover WW2 history

As part of the Year 8s study of WW2, all students went to Bletchley Park to learn about the role it played in the war.

Students learnt about all the men and women involved in helping decipher the messages that were being sent by the Axis powers and the work of Alan Turning in creating the Bombe to crack the Enigma Code.

Here is an account from Rachel Robinson in 8CTA about the day.

The trip to Bletchley Park was truly amazing! It was an incredible day filled with fun, laughter and learning. We got to have a workshop which taught us all about code-breaking in a fun way and a guided tour telling us all about what it was like to have been there in WW2.

The rooms that recreated what working at Bletchley Park would have been like were very interesting and super interactive!

Alongside its historical features, it is also a stunning park filled with beautiful, well-kept plants and flowers. My favourite bit of the day was the mansion as it was so grand and the number of books was incredible!—and of course, the ice cream!



All the Blues in the Sky by Renée Watson





Keeper of the Lost Cities: Unravelled by Shannon Messenger


While his friends faced their own challenges in Stellarlune, Keefe was in the human world. Where did he go, who did he see...and what shocking secrets were revealed to him?

This riveting instalment of the series is told entirely from Keefe's POV and contains crucial clues about truths buried deep in the elvin world.


The Encanto's Curse by Melissa de la Cruz

A vampire-like creature, a manananggal, is terrorizing Biringan, and newly crowned Queen MJ Robertson-Rodriguez must restore peace.







Upskilling with the NHS Cadets and browsing books at Scholastic

NHS Cadets: Interview techniques for Year 12

In our recent session of NHS Cadets, students were introduced to various types of interviews, equipping them with essential skills for their future. During the session, students explored different interview formats, including face to face, telephone, and virtual interviews, learning interview techniques to adapt their approach to each.

Our gardening enthusiasts have been hard at work cultivating a beautiful and diverse herb garden. Herbs not only add flavour and fragrance to our lives, but many also possess a wide range of therapeutic and health-boosting properties. Here are just a few of the wonderful herbs we've been growing, along with some fascinating facts about their traditional and modern uses:

Lemon Balm (Melissa officinalis)

This fragrant herb produces small white or pale-yellow flowers in summer, which are highly attractive to bees hence its genus name Melissa, the Greek word for "honeybee." Lemon balm is well-known for its calming effects on the nervous system and is often used to reduce stress, anxiety, and insomnia. It also supports digestive health and may help ease bloating and indigestion. The leaves can be infused into a soothing tea, added to salads for a citrusy lift, or even applied topically to help relieve cold sores and insect bites.

Cleavers (Galium aparine)

Commonly nicknamed "sticky weed" or the "Velcro plant" due to the tiny hooked hairs that help it cling to clothing and animal fur, cleavers is a gentle yet effective herb traditionally used to support the lymphatic system.

It has mild diuretic and detoxifying properties, making it useful for flushing out toxins and reducing swelling or congestion in the lymph nodes. Its anti-inflammatory action also makes it beneficial for soothing skin irritations. Cleavers can be juiced in spring tonics or eaten fresh in salads when young and tender.

Thyme (Thymus vulgaris)

Thyme is a small, woody shrub with aromatic grey-green leaves and clusters of pale pink to purple flowers that bloom from June through October. This herb has long been celebrated for its potent antimicrobial and antiviral properties, making it a natural ally for respiratory health. It's commonly used to help relieve coughs, sore throats, and bronchial conditions.

Beyond its medicinal use, thyme is a culinary favourite, adding robust flavour to soups, stews, pizzas, and roasted meats. It can also be prepared as a tea or used as a natural antiseptic mouthwash.

Rosemary (Salvia Rosmarinus)

With its dark green, needle-like leaves and delicate bluish flowers, rosemary is both visually striking and deeply aromatic. Traditionally associated with memory and mental clarity, rosemary has been shown to support cognitive function and circulation.

Its essential oil is widely used for relieving muscle pain, promoting hair growth, and soothing headaches. In the kitchen, rosemary adds depth and warmth to roasted vegetables, meats, breads, and Mediterranean-style dishes. It's a hardy herb that thrives even in dry conditions, making it a favourite among gardeners.

Having a gardening club at school offers students far more than the opportunity to grow plants. It provides a handson, engaging way to learn about science, the environment, and the life cycles of plants, while also encouraging responsibility, patience, and teamwork.














A-Level Sociology Exam Preparation Seminar: Expert Guidance from Keith Trobe

Bentley Wood High School's Year 13 Sociology students had the invaluable opportunity to attend an A-Level Sociology Exam Preparation Seminar led by Keith Trobe, a renowned author and expert in sociology education.

Keith Trobe, known for his extensive work in sociology education and exam preparation, delivered a highly engaging and insightful session focused on effective study skills and exam strategies. His seminar provided students with step-by-step guidance on tackling different types of exam questions, ensuring they understood how to structure responses for maximum marks.

Throughout the session, students explored:

- How to approach 10-mark and 20-mark questions with clear, well-structured arguments.
- The importance of synoptic links—connecting theories and concepts across different topics.
- Common pitfalls in sociology exams and how to avoid them.

Many students found the seminar incredibly useful, with one Year 13 student commenting:

"Keith Trobe's advice on structuring answers was eyeopening. I now feel much more confident about tackling longer essay questions!"

Another student highlighted the interactive nature of the session, saying:

"The seminar wasn't just about memorizing facts—it was about understanding how to think like a sociologist in an exam setting."

With A-Level exams fast approaching, students are now equipped with expert strategies to refine their revision and exam techniques.

The seminar reinforced the importance of critical thinking, structured writing, and applying sociological theories effectively—all essential skills for achieving top grades.

Engaging science talks this term

Outreach Science talk by Dr Tobi Alegbe

We were delighted to welcome Dr Tobi Alegbe back to our school recently to speak with some of our Year 9 classes and all of our Year 12 science students. Dr Alegbe, who had studied philosophy at Bentley Wood as one of his A-Levels alongside science subjects at another local Harrow secondary school, recently completed his PhD in Genetics at the University of Cambridge and now works as a Data Scientist.

In his talk, Dr Alegbe offered students a fascinating insight into the academic life and career of a research scientist. He shared details of some of the exciting developments in genetics he has been part of, illustrating how these novel developments build on the very science our students are learning today particularly around the Human Genome Project. It was a real privilege to hear about how data science is enhancing scientific discovery and how it can expand the application of science to the material world.

We are very grateful to Dr Alegbe for taking the time to share his experience and inspiring journey with us. We wish him all the best in the next chapter of his career and hope to see him again in the near future to share more of his insights with us!

A chemistry talk by Dr Ravi Singh

Dr Ravi Singh is a synthetic chemist who visited Bentley Wood and spoke about the various chemistry degrees and specialisations that Imperial College offers. He gave insight into his own PhD work, which was primarily focused on organic chemistry, but he also discussed the importance of physical chemistry, which is vital in understanding the behaviour of molecules — even in organic chemistry — as it helps explain reaction kinetics, energy changes, and how molecular interactions occur on a deeper, more quantitative level.

One project that really interested me was part of a firstyear chemistry lab, designed to give students handson experience in building and optimising scientific instruments. By using familiar materials like LEGO and integrating programming skills, students not only learned about spectroscopy but also about instrument design and data analysis. He explained how students are expected to construct their own low-cost UV-Vis spectrometer using materials such as LEGO, due to the high cost of industrial UV-Vis machines. He also shared how some Imperial students had created a patented UV-Vis machine. which is now used to identify the polymers in plastics, making recycling even more efficient. This innovative approach aimed to make spectroscopy more accessible









by significantly reducing costs, which was particularly inspiring to me. Such spectrometers can be constructed for as little as £50, compared to commercial models that can cost around £30,000.

Another very pertinent topic that Dr Singh discussed was computational chemistry. We were able to look at simulations that show how enzymes react with different drugs at a 3D level. He described how certain elements were indicated using different colours, enabling scientists to identify where different intermolecular forces form — for example, hydrogen bonding and dipole-dipole forces.

Finally, the 'rocket fuel' experiment was particularly interesting. Dr Singh informed us that he is the only individual who conducts this experiment at Imperial. It involved a carboxylic acid undergoing a nucleophilic attack and producing an amide, as well as light.

The light is produced when a molecule enters an excited state during the reaction, then falls back to a lower energy level and releases a photon (light). The reaction releases energy, and instead of just heat, some of that energy is emitted as visible light. This reaction is often used in forensic science. This particular insight demonstrated one of the most important chemical transformations in drug design amide bond formation — showing that even 'rocket fuel' reactions can be connected to medicinal chemistry.

The final two insights stood out to me because they expanded on my foundational knowledge of intermolecular forces as well as curly arrow mechanisms. Even though the rocket fuel experiment involves complex molecules and reactions beyond the A-level specification, it helped me visualise how these mechanisms — the ones we often draw with arrows and charges — actually manifest in real-world chemistry. It connected classroom theory with cuttingedge science, signifying why the theory actually matters.

This talk was incredibly beneficial in showing me that chemistry is not just confined to textbooks and exams it's a discipline that is constantly evolving, innovating, and impacting the world around us.

Whether it's designing affordable scientific instruments, predicting drug interactions on a molecular level, or seeing how light itself can be born from a chemical reaction — this experience reminded me that chemistry is a subject full of possibility, and I want to be a part of that.





The Unifrog platform is designed to support learners in making the most informed decisions about their futures and has a range of tools that are suitable for all year groups. Each student has their own personal account that provides a wide range of information related to their interests and aspirations. Key features of the platform include:

Exploring Pathways - personality quizzes, career and subject profiles, MOOCs and webinars

Recording - self-reflection about extracurricular activities and key employability skills

Staying Safe

Advice for Students:

- Talk to a trusted adult if anyone says or does anything that worries or frightens you. A trusted adult might be a family member or please contact the school someone will be there to support you.
- Always tell a trusted adult where you are going and what time you will return.
- Don't lend your mobile phone to anyone unless it is an
- Don't let anyone online trick you into doing something or sending pictures against your wishes.
- Don't share any passwords/login information keep them private and use complex passwords, too.
- Never give personal information to any person you don't know.

Safety and your mobile phone:

- Speak to a parent/trusted adult about who you are connecting with and not to purchase anything online without gaining an adult's permission first.
- Age Ratings on Apps are there to keep you safe.
- Only connect online with friends and family you know in the physical world and not to accept 'friend play request' from strangers.
- Don't put up with abusive texts, photos or video. Show them to an adult and report them.
- You should always speak to a trusted adult if you see or hear anything online that makes you feel scared or uncomfortable and to never arrange to meet someone who they have met online.
- When sharing images: you need consent to take and share images/videos of others. People also need your consent to take and share your image.
- If an image shows the private parts of a person who is under 18; it IS an indecent image: It is an offence if you: save it, share it, keep it, print it, forward it, show it.

Free School Meals eligibility

- Children are entitled to receive free school meals if they
 or their parents or guardians receive any of the benefits
 below.
- Universal Credit, provided they have an annual net earned income not exceeding £7,400 (£616.67 per month)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190, as assessed by HMRC
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

I don't currently claim free school meals - what does this mean for me?

If you think you might be eligible for free school meals, please see instructions here on how to check and apply.

I am currently claiming free school meals - what does this mean for me? Most people won't be affected by the new criteria. If you're currently claiming free school meals, but do not meet the new criteria, your child will continue to receive free school meals until the end of the Universal Credit rollout period.

This will apply even if your earnings rise above the new threshold or if you stop being entitled to Universal Credit. The Universal Credit rollout is currently expected to complete in March 2025. Once Universal Credit is fully rolled out, your

child will keep their free school meal until the end of their current phase of education, i.e. primary or secondary.

Student medication

In today's educational environment, ensuring that your daughters' medication or health condition is managed is extremely important. From the moment a student is diagnosed with a medical condition that requires medication, parents should inform the school and provide the necessary medication along with any supporting documentation.

When a student's medication or condition changes, parents must notify the school promptly this will ensure that they are given the right support including any adjustments to health care plans.

The welfare team will send reminders when your daughters' medication is due to expire so there is sufficient time to replace. We must have valid medications to respond effectively in case of an emergency.






We're using Arbor's free Parent Portal and Arbor App
