Since publishing his debut novel, Time Travelling with a Hamster, Ross has released a new book every year, each one further establishing his reputation as a captivating and important voice in children's fiction.

Ross is also a popular and well-known speaker, regularly invited to schools, libraries, and festivals across the country to share his love of storytelling with young audiences.





Engaging workshop on road safety

A few weeks ago, we had a very interesting company come to our school called The Riot Act. The company delivered a wonderful performance in which we learned about road safety. We were taught that people, friend or foe, can be dangerous when near a road.

In the show, we were introduced to two brothers on their way to school. They encountered a friend of Joe's (the older brother) called Fran; she was a stubborn person who, if you ask me, was quite irresponsible.

Midway through the show, Fran was persuading Joe's younger brother to run across the road with her as soon as a car was coming. He refused and told Fran not to do it, but she did it anyway and took his phone, which made him instinctively start to run after her. Luckily, Joe stopped him just in time.

Then, before the end of the show, they were all arguing and the younger brother's bag got thrown into the middle of the road. Joe went to get it impulsively without realising that a car was coming before it was too late.

I really enjoyed the mix of drama, discussion, and real-life scenarios to explore important issues such as making safe decisions, staying alert, and understanding the potential consequences of risky behaviour. This event helped reinforce skills such as responsibility and personal safety.



Bentley Wood students celebrate 25th anniversary of European Day of Languages

On 26th September, Bentley Wood students celebrated the 25th anniversary of European Day of Languages with a festival of activities to explore Europe's rich diversity of language and culture.

During form time, daily Wise Thoughts from the MFL department provided an insight into International Sign Language, a song quiz to guess the language of some well-known tunes, and forms competed against one another in a 'Where am I?' quiz, deciphering language clues to guess the location. Along the 25th anniversary theme, students made bookmarks as birthday presents for their friends, featuring birthday traditions from around the world.

At break and lunchtimes, students learned some useful phrases in the Romanian, Swedish and Portuguese taster sessions. Others enjoyed themselves after school watching the Italian version of the trending KPop Demon Hunters with popcorn, and some adventurous singers could be heard all along the MFL corridor trying out the ever-popular Spanish karaoke.

The MFL department ran a very popular challenge for European Day of Languages. Students were eager to get their hands on the passports, which served as their gateway to earning up to 25 Achievement Points.

Over the course of the week, groups of students formed around the school rushing to complete the 2025 Languages Passport - 25 challenges based around the various school subjects.

The challenge was so popular that the library ran out of passports several times throughout the week, requiring multiple reprints to keep up with demand!



Geography forest trip and urban study









Geography adventure at Epping Forest

On Thursday 16th Of October, geography pupils travelled to Epping Forest to visit a deciduous forest in order learn about ecosystems and biomes. Epping Forest is in Essex, and is a large deciduous woodland.

The main purpose of the trip was that Epping Forest allowed us to investigate a natural deciduous forest and consider different abiotic and biotic elements within it.

I think Epping Forest trip was a great experience as it consisted of elements of learning, fun and moments of clarity within it. Additionally, everyone's experiences varied, as for me, I saw animals I was not expecting, such as toad and deer.

In conclusion, we were able to point out and explain key differences between younger and older aspects of Epping Forests microhabitat.

On Thursday the 16th of October and Friday the 17th of October, Year 9 went on a trip to Epping Forest to further their understanding of ecosystems and how they interact with each other. This trip was useful for both geography and biology and was a more hands-on way of learning.

When we arrived, we were greeted by a bunch of friendly faces. We were split into our classes and were given worksheets to fill out throughout the day. Firstly, they talked about all the different layers of the forest like the canopy layer and the shrub layer. They told us about the history of Epping Forest and how it was once owned by the royal family who used it as hunting grounds and for timber and cattle.

As a history student, I thought it was really nice how we got a balance of geography, biology and history throughout the day. Then we had a look at the two areas of Epping Forest that we were going to explore: Paul's Nursery and Beech Hill. They picked these two sites for us to compare due to Beech Hill being a mature and ancient woodland whereas Paul's Nursery is a young woodland.

After this we ventured into the forest to visit these two locations. The forest was beautiful to walk through with each tree having an arrangement of autumn colours. Luckily for us, there wasn't any mud to travel through. While at

each location, we learned how to spot human involvement in forests and how to spot different species of trees and shrubs.

We then came back and discussed methods to find out answers to the different enquiries we had like how to calculate the height of a tree and how to sample different sections. Then after a short lunch break, we went back out into the forest and completed the tasks. We learnt how to use a clinometer, a light meter and a quadrat. For sampling, we selected two random numbers and placed the quadrat in that co-ordinate. After that, we counted the squares to see how much leaf litter, growing vegetation, and exposed soil there was. Finally, we measured the light intensity and using the quadrat, we calculated how much canopy cover there was. We repeated this for both locations then came back together to discuss our findings.

Overall, this trip was great as it enhanced my understanding of ecosystems and different research methods and equipment that could come up in my exams. Despite this trip being filled with information and knowledge, walking through the forest and having an active way to participate in my learning was refreshing after the first few weeks back in school.

Wembley Urban Study Day

Has the development of Wembley improved the area?

On our recent AQA human geography field trip to Wembley, we investigated whether the urbanisation in Wembley has positively or negatively impacted the area. Wembley has gone through lots of significant changes throughout recent years, including the construction of Wembley stadium, the demolition of the iconic twin towers, new housing developments, and much more accessible transport links. And we were aiming to assess whether these changes have benefited the community and environment.

Since the early 2000s, Wembley has seen a lot of regeneration to improve the area. It used to be known for old factories and poor-quality housing, but new plans were made to change that. Important developments include Wembley Stadium, the London Designer Outlet, and new high-rise flats. These changes were made to create jobs, bring in more visitors, and improve living conditions for local people.

On our field trip to Wembley, we used a range of human geography fieldwork methods to find out if regeneration has improved the area. We carried out environmental quality surveys to assess how clean, attractive, and safe different locations were. We also did questionnaires with residents and visitors to gather their opinions about the changes. These methods gave us both quantitative data (numbers and scores) and qualitative data (opinions and descriptions), which helped us understand how successful the regeneration has been.

To investigate if regeneration had been successful in Wembley. One way we checked if regeneration had been economically successful was through retail tally's. Armed with clipboards, we embarked in our quest in which we tallied different retail stores between sites; evaluating where regeneration was successful. In the end, we probably learned that regeneration is less about fancy buildings, but more about whether you can find a decent place to eat. Who knew geography could be so delicious?

The NHS Cadets

The NHS cadets programme is run by St. John Ambulance in partnership with the NHS trust. At Bentley Wood it is co-delivered by Miss Bhurani and Miss Nagvi. The programme is split into two pathways; Foundation pathway is delivered to Year 10 and Advanced pathway is delivered to Year 12 students. Both pathways deliver sessions on key skills, Leadership and career skills, understanding care and Clinical skills. Both pathways are oversubscribed.

This term students have focussed on understanding the care values of NHS and how these values match their own. They have also developed an understanding of branding and logos and the importance of representing

themselves. All students created a logo which represented their values and presented it to the rest of the group. Students were confident and developed presentation skills.

Year 10 have also focused on safeguarding - learning the importance of how to spot the signs of neglect and abuse as a care practitioner whilst Year 12 have focussed on the history of medication. They are currently researching ways in which AI can help improve medical advances.

STEM experiences and programmes













Year 10 Students Experience the Science of Colour at the Royal Institution

On the 28th of September, 21 Year 10 students took part in an immersive Colour Chemistry workshop at the Royal Institution's Young Scientists Centre (YSC), delivered in partnership with L'Oréal Laboratories. The workshop offered an engaging exploration of the chemistry behind colour in both pigments and light.

The workshop began with an investigation into how chemical bonding affects colour in pigments. Students had the opportunity to produce both a natural dye and a synthetic azo dye, gaining insight into the chemistry behind these widely used compounds and extending the learning of the students as far as A-level.

They then explored the use of coloured light in analytical chemistry by carrying out a colorimetry experiment to determine the concentration of an unknown dye sample—a process that links directly to real-world applications in science and industry.

The highlight of the day was an exciting fire demonstration led by the YSC presenter Rosie. This colourful display of flames and controlled explosions showcased how different metal salts produce distinctive colours in flame tests. bringing textbook chemistry to life in a dramatic and memorable way.

Students also had the privilege to explore the museum at the Royal Institution which contained an array of fascinating scientific apparatus and objects from the institution's history, including Michael Faraday's original magnetic laboratory, and historic items like Humphry Davy's miners' safety lamp.

Overall our students had a great day with the experience, showcasing how chemistry plays a vital role in industries such as cosmetics, textiles, and art.









Learning Sectors Programme: A Global STEM Partnership

This year, Bentley Wood High School proudly participated in the Learning Sectors Programme, a STEM-based international initiative led by the British Council. The programme brings together schools from across the world to collaborate on solving real-world issues through creativity, science, and teamwork.

Our school partnered with Indirapuram Public School for Girls in India. Together, our students explored challenges faced by each community and developed innovative STEM-based solutions. Communication and collaboration took place virtually through Microsoft Teams and Padlet, where both schools shared ideas, research findings, and resources.

Our Year 9 and Year 10 students worked brilliantly, taking part in student-led discussions, mind mapping sessions, and research projects. They focused on the issue of flooding in Bihar, India, learning how it affects rural electrification and contributes to poverty. This experience not only deepened their understanding of global challenges but also introduced them to new cultural ideas, such as the Hindi term "Jugaad" — meaning creative problemsolving with limited resources.

The project was a wonderful example of teamwork and global learning. It gave our students the opportunity to strengthen vital skills such as collaboration, communication, and critical thinking — while developing a deeper appreciation for how STEM can be used to make a positive impact.

A special mention must go to Heba K 13EV, who managed the overall delivery of the project with incredible dedication, organisation, and leadership. Without her hard work, this collaboration would not have been possible — all credit goes to her!

The Learning Sectors Programme has been an inspiring journey for everyone involved, reminding us that when young people work together across borders, they can achieve remarkable things.























Sporting success in netball and enriching PE clubs





In keeping with our commitment to provide students with outstanding careers guidance and tailored support when choosing their next step after school and further education, we are using Unifrog; an award-winning, online careers platform. All students in Years 7 to 13 already have access to this excellent website. The Unifrog platform is designed to support learners in making the most informed decisions about their futures and has a range of tools that are suitable for all year groups. Each student has their own personal account that provides a wide range of information related to their interests and aspirations. Key features of the platform include:

Exploring Pathways - personality quizzes, career and subject profiles, MOOCs and webinars.

Recording – self-reflection about extracurricular activities and key employability skills.

Opportunities – search tools showing live vacancies/ courses/placements for apprenticeships, universities (in the UK and abroad), FE, virtual work experience and much more.

Staying safe

- Don't let anyone online trick you into doing something or sending pictures against your wishes.
- **Don't share** any passwords/login information keep them private and use complex passwords, too.
- Never give personal information to any person you don't know.

Safety and your mobile phone:

- Speak to a parent/trusted adult about who you are connecting with and not to purchase anything online without gaining an adult's permission first.
- Age Ratings on Apps are there to keep you safe.
- Only connect online with friends and family you know in the physical world and not to accept 'friend play request' from strangers.
- Don't put up with abusive texts, photos or video. Show them to an adult and report them.
- You should always speak to a trusted adult if you see or hear anything online that makes you feel scared or uncomfortable and to never arrange to meet someone who they have met online.
- When sharing images: you need consent to take and share images/videos of others. People also need your consent to take and share your image.
- If an image shows the private parts of a person who
 is under 18; it IS an indecent image: It is an offence if
 you: save it, share it, keep it, print it, forward it, show it.

Free School Meals eligibility

- Children are entitled to receive free school meals if they
 or their parents or guardians receive any of the benefits
 below.
- Universal Credit, provided they have an annual net earned income not exceeding £7,400 (£616.67 per month)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190, as assessed by HMRC
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

I don't currently claim free school meals - what does this mean for me?

If you think you might be eligible for free school meals, please see instructions here on how to check and apply.

I am currently claiming free school meals - what does this mean for me? Most people won't be affected by the new criteria. If you're currently claiming free school meals, but do not meet the new criteria, your child will continue to receive free school meals until the end of the Universal Credit rollout period. This will apply even if your earnings rise above the new threshold or if you stop being entitled to Universal Credit. The Universal Credit rollout is currently expected to complete in March 2025. Once Universal Credit is fully rolled out, your child will keep their free school meal until the end of their current phase of education, i.e. primary or secondary.



Managing your daughters' medication or health condition

In today's educational environment, ensuring that your daughters' medication or health condition is managed is extremely important.

From the moment a student is diagnosed with a medial condition that requires medication, parents should inform the school and provide the necessary medication along with any supporting documentation.

When a student's medication or condition changes, parents must notify the school promptly this will ensure that they are given the right support including any adjustments to health care plans.

The welfare team will send reminders when your daughters' medication is due to expire so there is sufficient time to replace. We must have valid medications to respond effectively in case of an emergency.

Stay at Home — 48 Hour Rule

If your child experiences vomiting or diarrhoea, they should not return to school until at least 48 hours (two full days) after their last episode. This helps prevent the spread of infections to other children and staff.

This "48 hour exclusion" is also in line with Public Health / school illness guidance.

Non-Prescribed Medications.

Students are not permitted to carry non-prescribed medications, such as paracetamol, ibuprofen, or over-the-counter remedies. These will be confiscated by school staff to ensure the safety and well-being of all students.

Exceptions: Asthma Inhalers and Adrenaline Auto-Injectors (AAIs)

Students are permitted to carry asthma inhalers and adrenaline auto-injectors (such as EpiPen, Jext) on their person. This allowance is based on the critical need for immediate access to these medications in emergencies.


Dropping off and collecting your daughter from school
